


This was done by sitting and listening to Peter Sturtevant Jr. a keynote speaker, lecture and then having a set amount of time to write a story. Our editor won a second place award for her feature

story. During last summer from July twelfth through the sixteenth, three members attended a Journalism Summer Workshop also at the University of Iowa. This gave a short look at college life and an abundance of information. There were lectures every day, story assignments, and more lectures. There were tips given on how to handle financial problems for your school newspaper, ideas for feature and sports stories, and basic


layout and design techniques.



As the season progresses, the Marion girls' track team has produced several outstanding performances. A prime example of their track prowess is the 440 relay team consisting of sophomore Heidi Dixon, junior Lisa Canavan, and seniors Stephanie Bennett and Laura Kos. This particular ensemble has not been beaten the entire season in this event; undefeated in ten outings.

Other fine areas were the long jump, 2 mile relay record, 880 yard relay, 100 meter hurdles, 220 yard dash, sprint medley relay, 440 yard relay, and the mile run.

In the long jump, Heidi Dixon leaped for a first place win of 15'4", just beating the 2nd place jump by 1 inch.

In the two mile relay, Marion ran to a 3rd place with a time of 10:41.64 only 23.55 behind the first place time.

The 880 yard relay was won by Marion in a time of 1:51.39. The foursome that ran in that event were Heidi Dixon, Laura Kos, Lisa Canavan, and Stephanie Bennett. That foursome also won the 440 yard relay with a time of 53.12; pulling forth another win for them in that event. As was mentioned, they

haven't been beat in that event yet.


The 100 meter hurdles was a very close event. Tami Meister ran and hurdled for a 2nd place for Marion with a time of 16.74 (only 1 second behind the first place time).

Susan Clover, a sophomore, ran the 220 yard dash and placed fourth with a time of 30.12 only 1.5 second behind the first place time.

1:57.90 was the first place time of the Sprint Medley Relay and that was the time of Marion's team. That four women team was Laura Kos, Lisa Canavan, Stephanie Bennett, and Chris Siepker.

In the Mile Relay, Marion ran for a 3rd place with a time of 4:25.77, only 6.09 behind the first place time. The four women who ran in that event were Tina Norris, Tami Meister, Pam Jellison, and Chris Siepker.

After an excessive workout, the team standings stood as follows from first to sixth; First place was Anamosa with 59 points, 2nd place was LaSalle with 54 points, 3rd place was Maquoketa with 53.5 points, 4th place was Benton Community with 51.5 points, tied for 5th was Marion and Linn-Mar with 38 points, and in 6th place was Prairie with 17 points.


The Marion High School tennis courts have been full of activity this past month, as the boys' and girls' tennis teams have been preparing for the 1982 season.
