
A few seniors were asked specifically what they wanted for graduation and senior Dan Teff said, "I want a laptop because it will help me with ...







Laptop Protection 101

With college very near for seniors, most of them will be either buying a laptop computer, or will be recieving one as part of their college tuition. However, for all of their glory, there are some things every student should be aware of after receiving their new computer that can help keep the computer, and all of its files safe.

Anti-Virus:

Most new laptop computers come with either Norton AntiVirus, or McAfee anit-virus programs. These will always have a 90 day or one year subscription that is activated at the time of the computer purchase. Once that subscription has run out it could cost \$30 - \$45 dollars to renew the subscription for another year. It is very important that you routinely run a virus scan on your computer. If you do a lot of web surfing, then it should be done at least once a week. Whenever the anti-virus program detects an active internet connection it will automatically download the latest virus definitions to keep your protection up to date. If you do not want to pay \$60 for an anti-virus program and the yearly subscription fee, there are also free downloadable programs that work just as well. The best being Avast! Anti-Virus, Avast! is completely free as long as the program is being used for personal, not business use.

Wireless:

comes a whole new world of mystery to explore... Wireless Internet. It is everywhere nowadays, even at Burger Kings, Walmarts, and Panera Bread, and if you aren't careful with how you use it, you are placing your computer under unnecessary risks to catch viruses and to let unwanted people view your internet activity.

To activate your wireless connection, if on

a PC, first make sure your antenna is turned on, there is usually a switch on the right hand side of the computer, or it could be located along the top portion of the keyboard. Once the antenna is turned on there should be a light turned on to let you know. (Not all computers have an external switch to toggle on/off the wireless antenna, if there is no switch then the wireless connection is on by default.) If your computer is within the range of any wireless signal then there will be a little pop-up window by your clock in the botom right-hand corner of the screen. All you have to do is either click on that window, or right click on that icon and go to View Available Wireless Networks.

With the ever so portable laptop computer - The next window will show you all the signals your computer can see. To connect all you do is click on the signal name and click the "connect" button. The only reason this would not work is if there is a little padlock icon by the signal name, this means that you will need a password to connect

> Make sure that you know and trust the source of the signal you are connecting too, because any and all internet activity can be monitored on the wireless network that you are connected to!

Wireless Security:


More and more college campuses are starting to cover their whole campus with wireless internet, and if that is the case, the signal will already be secured. So the college will give you he necessary password information to get online. If however you are setting up your own wireless network, you will need a few things. First make sure that you have a router. A cable modem is NOT a router and cannot emit a wireless signal. Routers can cost anywhere from \$20-\$100 depending on the quality and features you want. They are very simple to hookup, you just follow the directions and plug your router into your pre-existing cable or DSL modem.


Why bother securing your wireless internet? The answer is because if you leave your wireless open to anyone that wants to connect, for each person connected they all share equally a portion of your internet connection, the more people connected, the slower it is for everyone. Also any illegal things done using the internet, or an internet connection don't get traced back to the person owning the computer, they get traced back to the person that owns the internet connection that committed the crimes. So always be aware of who might be using you internet, and the best way to do this is to secure your wireless.

Steps to secure the connection:

Every router should have at least one form of encryption (security) this is usually in the form of WEP encryption (Wired Equivalant Privacy.) To find out you first have to login to your router, to do this, open your internet broswer and in the address bar type in either 192.168.0.1 or 192.168.1.1, only on of these will work, it all depends on the brand of router you are using. You will then be taken to the interface for your router. Caution: Be careful what you change in here, make sure you know what changes you are making before you change them. There should be a section titles WEP, Security, or Wireless. All you have to do is select whether or not to activate the security and set a password. Once this is done you will need to have the correct password whenever you or someone else wants to connect to the internet.

Although it may sound complicated, it really isn't and the benefits far out way the potential risks involved with lettting anyone connect to your wireless internet.
