FUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS

Did you know that a movement has been started to provide a supervised program of rlay and recreation during summer and winter for all ares? The program would include handierafts, nature study, workshops, tennis, softball leagues, and provisions for skating, coasting and skiing.

The Board of School Directors would control the playgrounds. The cost of the program and equipment would be met by a half-mill levy. This levy will raise approximately \$1125. The cost to the taxpayer would amount to only an additional 88¢ if his property tax is now \$100.


