Student Council would like you to meet Le Van Lap. Van Lap is the little Viet-nam boy who has been "adopted" by the Council through the Christian Children's Fund.

Van Lap's background is marked by pov-erty and privation. Though he will be 11 years old on February 16, he is only in the second grade in school. No information is available as to the whereabouts of Van Lap's father. It is thought that h became so discouraged by the hardships of his life that he went away in search of a better way to live. Van Lap's mother works hard but her meager income is not sufficient to support her six children. Therefore two of the Le children have been admitted to the Christian Children Fund project. Van Lap is a Saigon family helper. His chores consist of sweeping. His favorite subject is dictation. He is in good health for a boy living under the conditions he has been a part of. Like any little boy Van Lap likes to play and his favorite play is ball games. Up until this time, Van Lap's progress has been listed only as "fair", but the Council hopes that their sponsorship will help Van Lap to lead more of the kind of life that a little boys needs and deserves to lead.

Although they got off to a rocky start by losing to Iowa City, 87-64, the Indians roared back with wins of 45-38 over Tipton, 73-56 over Linn-Mar, and 53-48 over Monticello.

The big factors in the Indian's success thus far in the season have been the hustthus far in the season have been the hust-ling of Marion on offense, defense, and especially off the boards. The two for-wards have been the big scorers with Jim Simpson averaging 16.5 points per game and Mike Hebert averaging 12 points in every contest. Junior Varsity squad

A few weeks ago a questionnaire was taken as part of a panel on early mar-riage for Social Problems. All three grades participated. The following is a summary of the questionnaire as a whole:

The majority of the student body takes marriage seriously and believes it should last a lifetime. 90% of the girls see marriage on a permanent basis. The boys were a little more skeptical with 80% believing in marriage as a lifetime relationship. This confidence in the last-ing quality of marriage contradicts those who say that young people take marriage lightly, believing that they can get a divorce if "it doesn't work out.

In response to the question, "Would you like your marriage to be like that of your parents?" 35% of the boys and 50% of the girls rejected their parent's marriage as ideal. This tends to suggest that the students here want stronger, happier homes than those in which many are growing up now

In opport nones that those in which that are growing up now. In opposition to the impression that all that counts in marriage is love, the students showed that they're not unreal-istically romantic. 65% of the boys and 70% of the girls felt there was more to marriage them have

marriage than love. The replys to the question, "What was your source of information about love and marriage?" can be classed in three general categories:

- 1. From their parents
- 2. From friends their own age 3. Reading.
- The seniors credited their parents

with teaching them about love and marriage, with friends coming in second and reading third. But in contrast a slight generation gap was shown with the juniors and sophomores; their friends came in first, their parents second, and reading last.

The old definition of going steady, when one was "engaged to be engaged" is fast becoming obsolete. By far the most popular definition of going steady was "going with only one person be-cause you like him or her and no one else." It is interesting to note that most of the students who referred back to the old meaning, were juniors and seniors, with only 3% of the sophomores agreeing. About 1/5 of the juniors and 1/3 of the sophomores mentioned the "exchanging of rings.

When asked if they'd be able to recog-nize the "right one" when he turns up, 50% of the boys and 70% of the girls answered with a firm "no!", thus contra-dicting the fantasy of love at first sight. It seems that the MHS students view marriage with a realistic and farsighted viewpoint, and might even walk into marriage with a firmer step than their parents had.
