The Little Indians are still hanging in tight in the WaMac but the next few games are going to be tough challenges against their championship bid.

In Contest For WaMac Bid

Since the last VOX edition, the Indians varsity basketball team has been in top contention for the WaMac conference championship. Although the Indians are boasting an only mediocre overall season mark, they have been playing a major part of drawing the conference championship into a tight battle between three or four teams.

The Indians have recently played games in which they dropped nonconference games to Cedar Rapids Jefferson and Prairie. WaMac games have been a different story, however, for Marion beat Independence 61-54, beat low-rated Maquoketa 47-46, lost to Anamosa 63-56, upset Manchester 53-51 in an overtime thriller, beat Tipton 48-42, and lost to Monticello 46-44.

The big story in recent games has been free throws. Outside dedicated practice to the gift tosses has been paying off in the clutch moments of a game. Take for instance these two examples where a free throw pulled out a game for the Indians.

In the Manchester game Dan Ciha came off the bench for Mike Hebert in the waning moments and popped in two free throws to pull the game out of the fire. Those were the only points Dan scored in that game.

However, the heroes haven't always been the low scorers. Four of the starting five have usually been balanced in scoring while the fifth has a good night and pops in a lot of points. The scoring honors recently have been switching from Skip Smith to Mike Hebert to Russ Glasgow and Dan Ciha. It is this great versatile team that is making the varsity team a fine one this year.

Madeson And DeBow Win

The Marion wrestlers traveled to Independence on December 23, for the WaMac wrestling conference meet. The Indians came home with two individual champs, and a team spot of sixth. Marion's two champs were Mike Madeson and Gary DeBow.

Mike Madeson won easily at his weight. He had a 10-3 first round victory, pinned his opponent in 57 seconds in the second round, and won in the finals 17-3.

Gary drew in his first round, won 6-3 in the second round, and won 3-2 in the finals.

MANCHESTER DOWNS MARION 34-12

Manchester defeated Marion 34-12 January 19 on the Indian mat. Mike Madeson won by a fall in 1:35 for the only Marion pin. Steve Smith won by a decision 9-8. Gary DeBow drew in his match 0-0, as did Steve Tuthill 1-1.

MARION TOPS MONTICELLO

Marion handed the Monticello wrestlers a 42-6 defeat January 26, on the Monticello mat. The Indians won ten of the 12 matches, six of them by falls. Charlie

Krizek recorded the fastest pin by downing his foe in one minute.

Other pins were recorded by Dennis Oliphant in 1 min. 35 sec., Dennis Rule in 1 min. 5 sec., Bob Whittemore in 5 min. 35 sec., Steve Smith in 2 min. 21 sec., and Chuck Rielly in 1 min. 27 sec.

The other four winners for Marion were Mike Madeson 8-4, Rick Danford 9-7, Gary DeBow 6-3, and Steve Tuthill 4-2.

The Marion reserves also won 39-0 making it a double victory for the Indians. The reserves took three falls Jim Sankey in 1 min. 19 sec., Alan Moorehead in 1 min. 24 sec., and Bob Hoke in 3 min. 49 sec.

Three reserves had decisions Bob Cole 9-2, Joe Churchill 10-1, and Steve Ranes 20-3.
