

They arrived in San Antonio by Plane and then travelled on to the border where they borded a Mexican train. Arriving in Mexico City, a bit weary but excited, the group immediately began taking in all the sights.

While in Mexico City, these twenty-two enthusiastic tourists attempted to visit all the major attractions of the old, historic city and the picturesque countryside surrounding it. Either by means of the crowded city buses or by foot, they managed to visit the beautiful floating gardens of Xochimilico, the famed Chapultapec Park, the ancient Pyramids of the Sun and the Moon, and the new Olympic stadiums still under construction. While viewing the sights, the students also tried to discover as much as possible about the people and their customs. Therefore, they enjoyed particularly the Mexican and African Ballets and participating in the bartering which is commonplace at the market of Toluca.

From Mexico City, the group also took a brief trip to the coastal resort city of A capulco.

Fortunately, none of the group was injured, in fact, one even managed to sleep through it. One other custom which they tried to adapt to was the unusual eating schedule: breakfast at 11:00, lunch at 3:00, and dinner at 9:00.


## Improved Season




During the summer, three of Marion's varsity cheerleaders travelled to Minnesota to attend an action-packed week of camp.






## What Would You Dos ?
