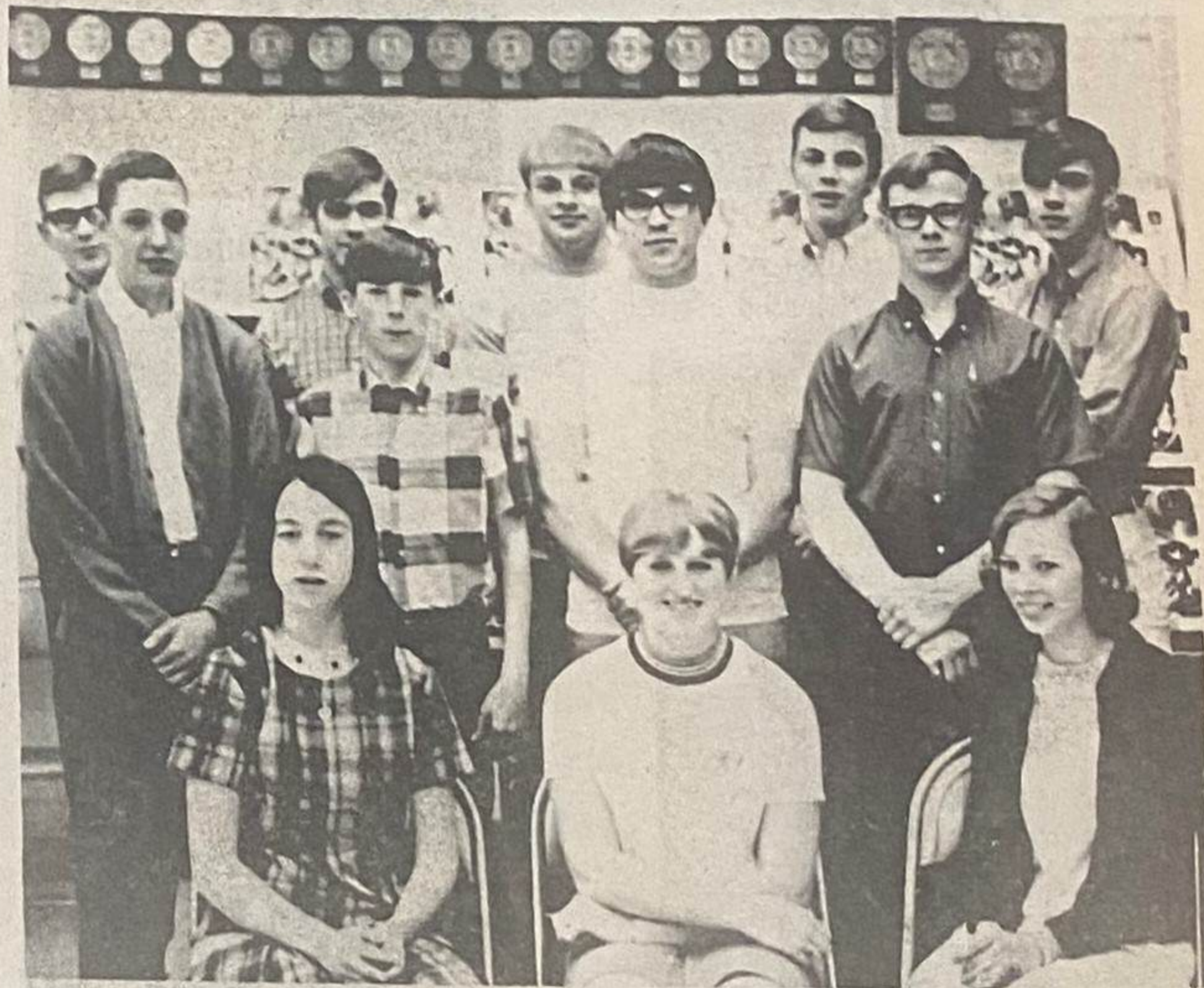
Many of the rooms included in this expansion were completed several months ago and are now being taken advantage of. The enlarged locker room, the new wrestling room, in addition to the new storage space and offices have been particularly valuable this year.

In alleviating the crowded conditions several types of rooms have been incorporated in the addition. These include: four double-sized classrooms with folding doors (which will make eight rooms), two teachers' offices, three rooms for the mathematics department, a new science laboratory, a vocal music room

with permanent risers, two vocal music practice rooms, a vocal music teacher's office, an art room, a work or activities area, and three language rooms with a language lab in the center room.

In the center of the addition will be four other classrooms used for large group instruction.

The new stage, which is also being constructed, will be 5 feet high and will have storage space behind and directly off the stage. The library is being greatly expanded and will have a conference room and a periodical room directly off the study area. Additional rooms for drafting, wood shop, and auto mechanics will also be included in the new addition.

With the additional space to accommodate additional students, additional teachers will also have to be placed on the staff. According to Mr. Morgan, three teachers from the Junior High faculty will be teaching at the High School next fall. They are: Mrs. Stack, who will teach in the Business Department, Mrs. Rowan, who will teach in the Mathematics Department, and Mr. DeWees, who will teach in the Science Department.

Mr. Morgan also commented that he is most happy that the freshman will be attending MHS next year. He feels that they will contribute more to our school spirit and that they will want to get involved in the many extra curricular activities. Furthermore, he is of the opinion that they will be a great addition to Marion High School since they are young and vivacious.

Marion band members have been busy the past few weeks.

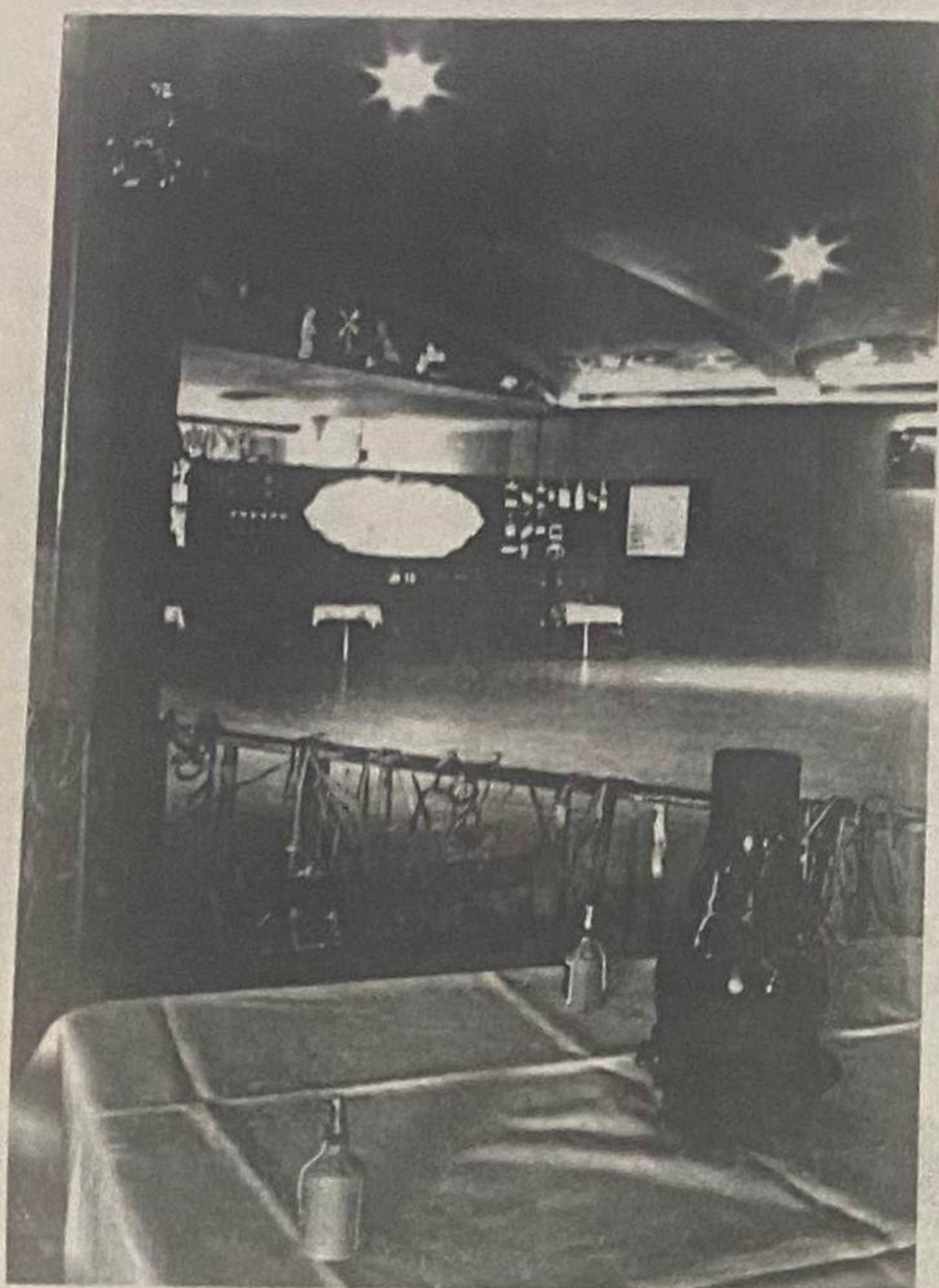

Science Awards To Doug Beadle

Congratulations are to be extended to Doug Beadle for his recent accomplishments at the Twentieth Annual Science Fair in Fort Worth, Texas. Doug, a senior at Marion High School, received a \$100 Savings Bond from the Society of Photographic Scientists and Engineers, the Certificate of Achievement from the American Meteorological Society, and Alternate Award and a Letter of Recognition from the Oceanographer of the Navy in recognition of his work. His project in the fair was entitled "Interpretation of Clour Temperatures from Radiation Measurements of Nimbus I and II". Doug was one of 391 exhibitors at the fair who came from 46 states and several foreign countries. During his stay in Fort Worth from May 6-9; he was accompanied by Mr. Rinas, his physics teacher. Doug became eligible to participate in the fair by placing first in the Eastern Iowa Science Fair in April.

This is the time of the year the teachers look forward to for their special meals, even though they may have to eat dinner at 9:00 in the morning.

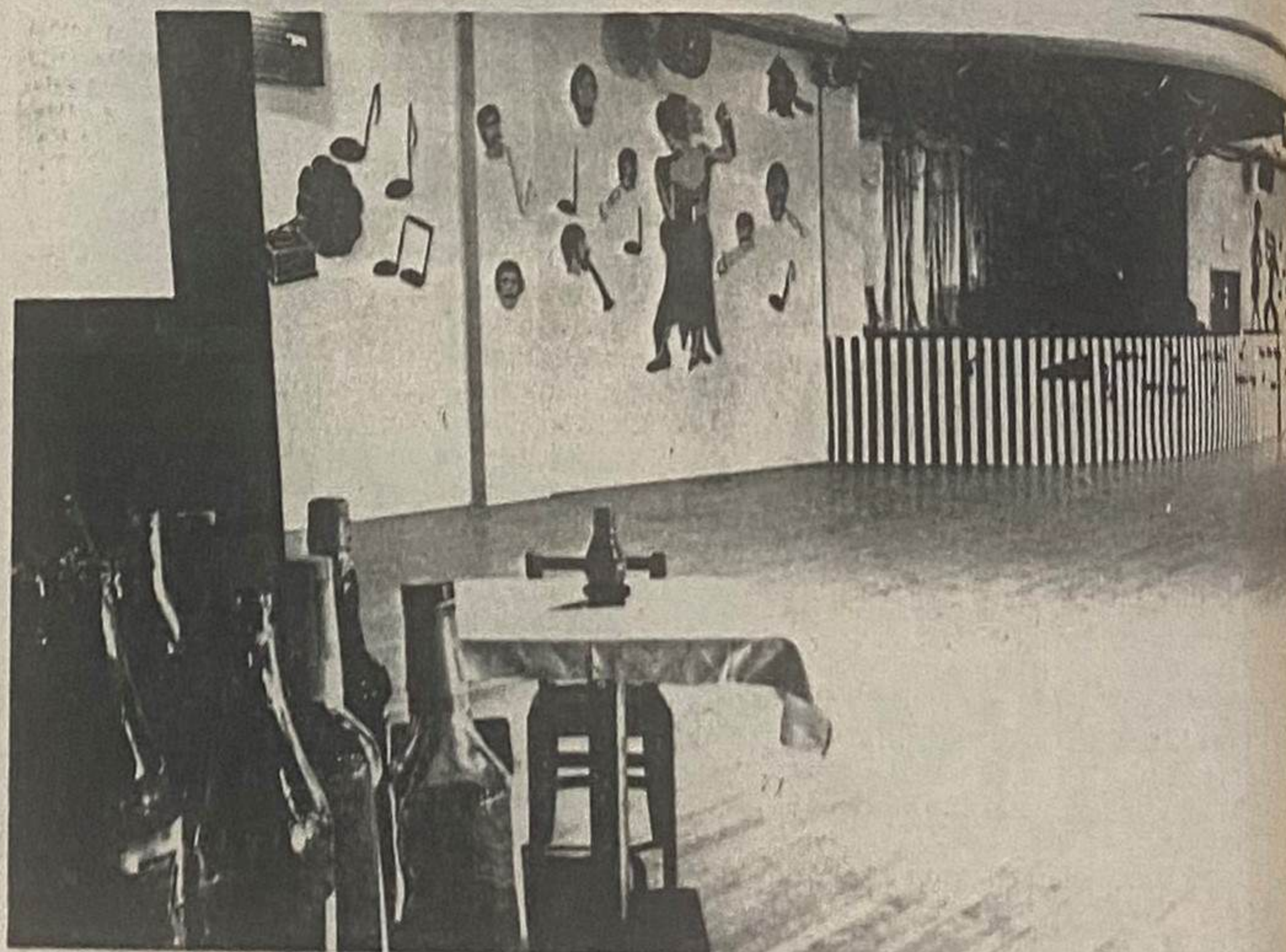
GRA Hold Annual Banquet

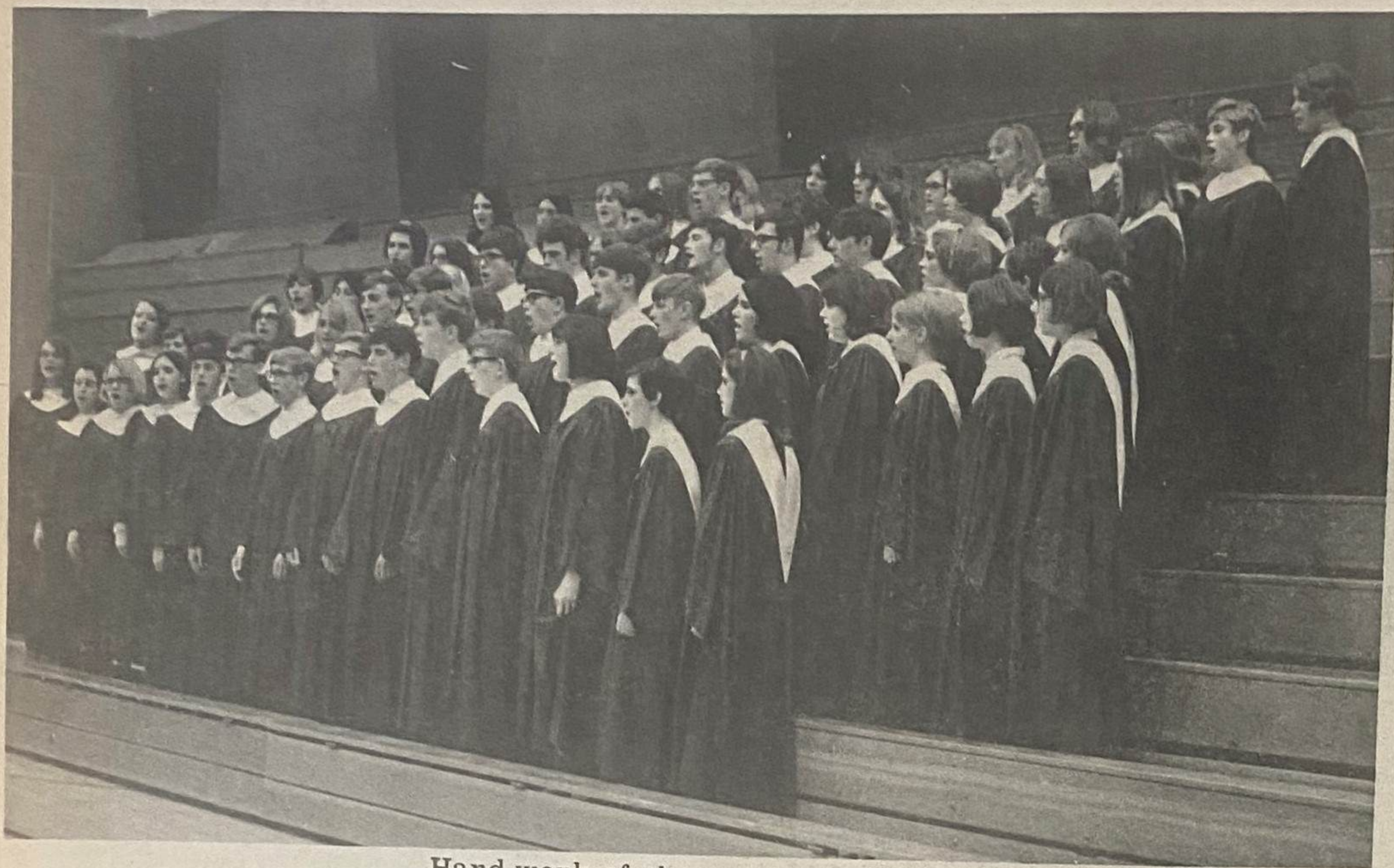

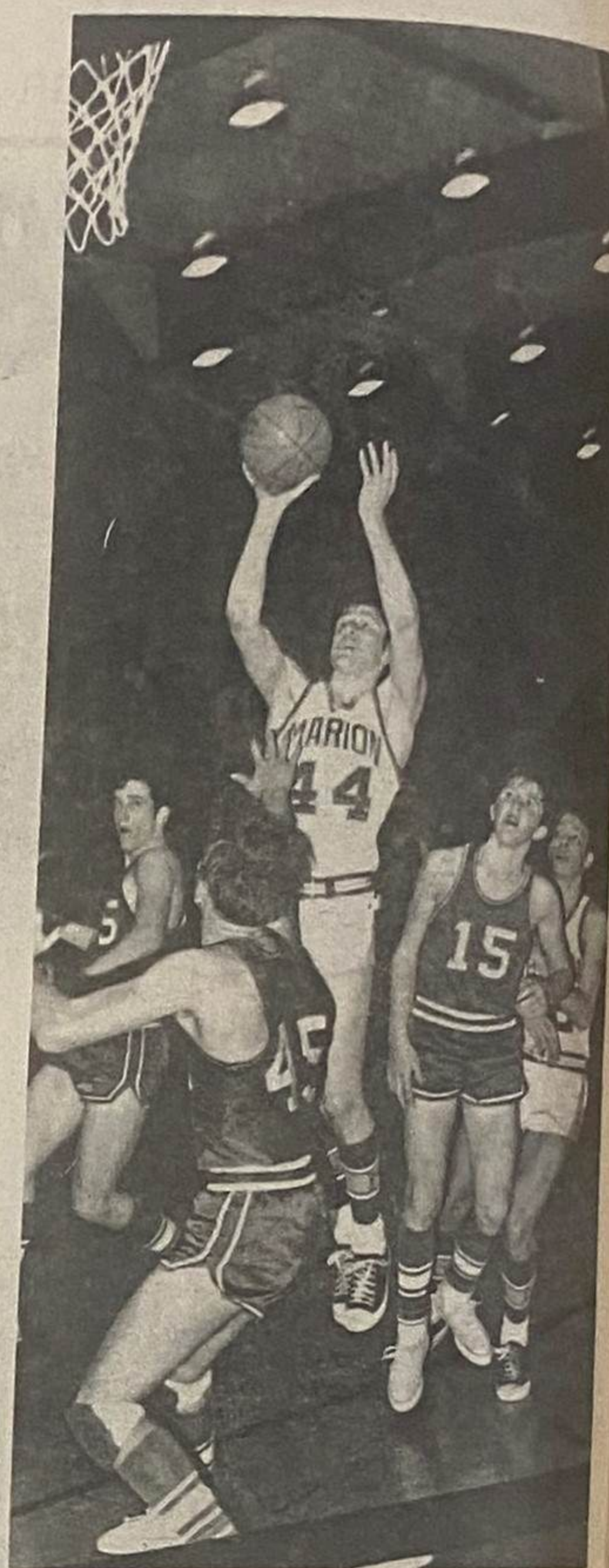

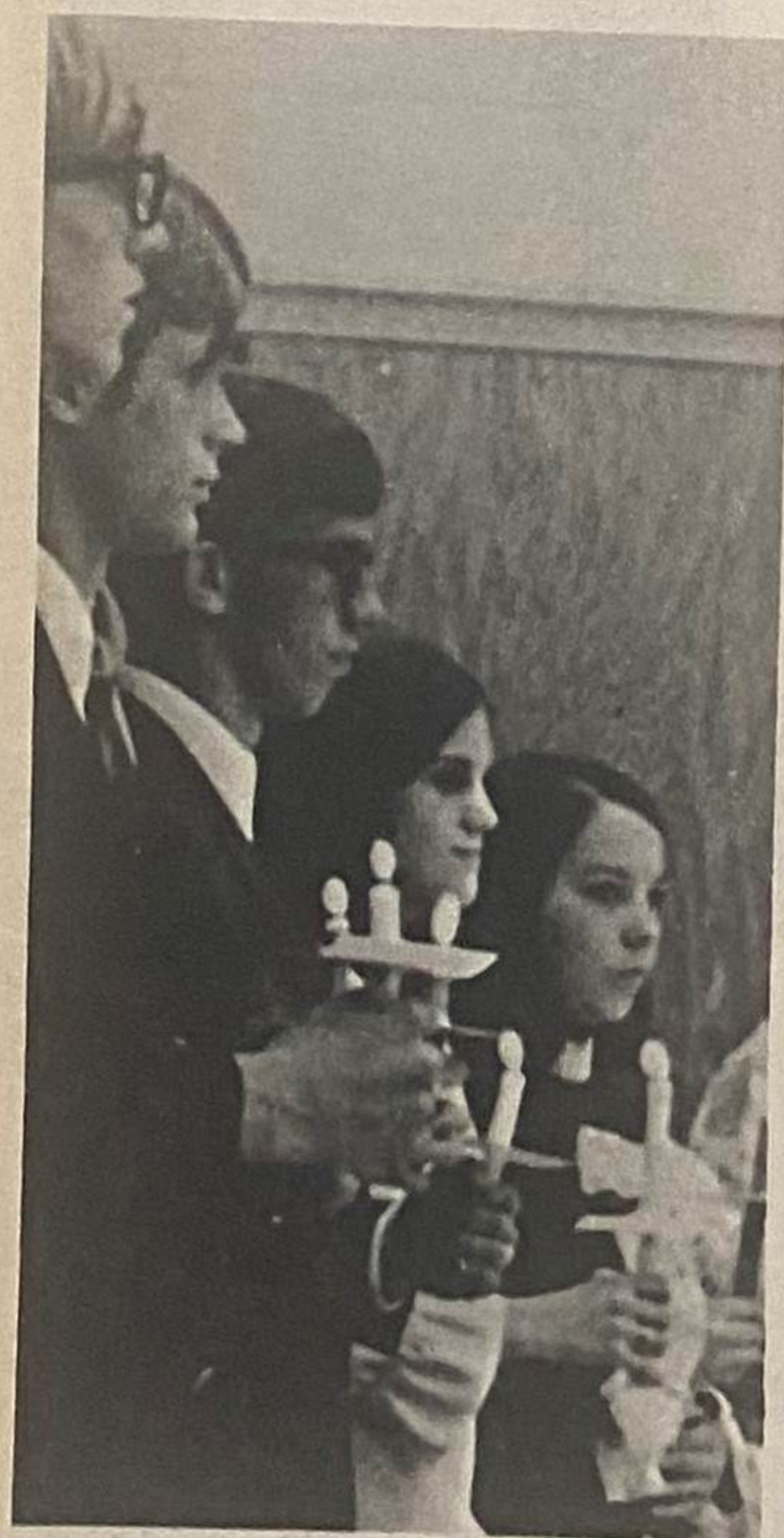
