Indians Win Homecoming 34-20

Homecoming was a complete success
for MHS because of the Indians' victory
over Independence. Marion used a grinding ground game to beat the Mustangs
34-20. The Indians took the opening
kickoff sixty-eight yards in fourteen straight running plays. Steve Stone scored
the first touchdown on a play from nine
yards out. Dave Ward's extra point gave
Marion a 7-0 lead. The Indian defense
stopped the Mustangs on their first series
of downs and forced them to punt, but Independence recovered a Marion fumble on dependence recovered a Marion fumble on the Indians 22 yard line to regain posses-sion. Mark Hoover, quarterback for the Mustangs scored from the one, but Kevin Collins blocked the try for point.

The Indians scored twice in the third

period; first on a five yard run by Paul Martin and then on an eighteen yard pass from Jim Meggers to John Parks. Independence stayed within striking distance,

pendence stayed within striking distance, however, with a touchdown pass from Hoover to Freebern.

In the third quarter Marion scored again on a thirteen yard run up the middle by Greg Morris capping a drive led by Morris and Paul Martin. Independence came up with its final score by halfback Rick Freebern, who ran seven yards for the touchdown. Marion's running backs rushed for 296 yards and sixteen first downs against Independence—both figures are the high mark for the Indian offense this year. Paul Martin ran for 125 yards, also the highest mark for one runner this year. Jim Meggers scored the final touchdown from two yards out and Ward's fourth extra point finished the scoring in the game.

Invade Benton

Marion was fresh from a 46-0 victory over Linn-Mar when the Indians invaded Benton Community at Van Home on September 12th. The Bobcats and Linn-Mar belong to the same East Central Iowa Conference, but Benton, led by quarterback Dan Stellner's passing was more highly regarded in pre-season predictions. Marion's inside running attack struck early in the game when Greg Morris ran off tackle for two yards and a touchdown to end a drive led by Steve Stone and Paul Martin. Dave Ward added the first of three extra points to give the Indians a 7-0 extra points to give the Indians a 7-0 lead.

During the second quarter Morris scored again after the running of Martin and Mark Witte placed the ball on the one yard line. The Bobcats scored on a thirty-five yard passing play from Stellner to Tiedemann. Marion began to pull away from Benton in the 3rd quarter. Witte scored on a seven yard run and Paul Martin added a two point conversion that gave tin added a two point conversion that gave the Indians a 22-6 lead. BC scored again on a two yard running play to finish a drive that was almost stalled several times by dropped passes and a good Marion pass

On the kickoff following the touchdown, Kurt Anderson took the ball on the 30 yard line and raced 70 yards for the fourth Marion TD. Late in the fourth quarter Greg Morris scored his third touchdown of the night to give the Indians a 37-14 victory.


MUERTE

Marion scored in the first quarter although Megwas able to start several drives toward the goal line, but seemed to stall inside the fifteen yard line. Penalties and a fumble stopped the Indians twice when they were only five yards from a touchdown. Marion stayed in the game, however, until late in the fourth quarter when two more scores added by Gade and Chuck Geadelmann gave the Tigers a 19-0 win.

Early in the fourth period a Marion drive failed to supply a TD, but Dave Ward kicked a 19 yard field goal to give the Indians three more points. A two yard run by Kevin Collins with four minutes left in the game ended the last Marion drive and completed the scoring in the Indian's 22-0 victory.

The Indians record now is 4-1, 2-1 in the conference.

Soph Continue To 'Roll Along'

Marion's sophomore football squad is rolling right along towards a fine season. As of press time the sophs had a 5-0 season record and a 3-0 conference record. The sophs have rolled up victories during the past worth of 54-0 cover Ferran Cooperation. the past month of 54-0 over Benton Community, 26-6 over Tipton, 20-6 to beat Vinton, and 46-14 to top Independence.

The sophomores have a phenomenal offense-defense combination that has helped them to win ball games. The defense, in the past four games, have allowed 139 yards rushing and 181 yards passing while allowing only 20 first downs, intercepting 7 passes, and recovering 6 tumbles. In addition south defense accord these affections 7 passes, and recovering 6 fumbles. In addition soph defense scored three safeties in the Vinton game. Players in on these safeties were Jerry Lancaster. Van Gillman, Brad Kiburz, Rodger Bailey, and John Winistorfer. Bailey has shown he knows what to do when he intercepts a pass. He has intercepted two passes this year and ran them both back for TDs. One TD was 50 yards and the other 85 yards.

In the past four games the soph offense has racked up 1040 yards rushing (including 438 alone in the Indee game) and 230 yards passing. Backs Jerry Lancaster, Van Gillman, and Mike Ciha do an excellent job grinding out the yardage. Lancaster has been having some very excellent games as illustrated in the Independence game. Jerry scored four touch-downs in that game (only one was under 42 yards long) and rushed for 246 yards despite the fact he was out most of the 3rd quarter with an injury.

The sophs have been getting good protection from the line. Very good play has been turned in by linemen like Richard Delp, Jerry Morgan, Joel Cox, Brad Kiburz, Mark Burgess, Rodger Bailey, and John Winistorfer.

The soph squad is an overpowering one, could go a long way, and are an excellent team to watch.
