Marion High Students Take Trip To Mexico

"I'm going again next year" was the general remark made by most of the fourteen persons from Marion who spent thirteen days in Mexico this past summer. Eight of the fourteen were third year Spanish students at Marion High School: Margaret Boquist, Cindy Brackett, Jana Ketelsen, Linda Redford, Becky Renter, Jackie Schroeder, Janine Smaby, and Susan Wilkey. Two others were graduating senior students: Bev Dicus and Susan Renter. The remaining four were the group's chaperones: Mrs. Charles Boquist, Mrs. Don Ketelsen, Mrs. Abbott Mayer and Mrs. Robert Verhille.

As part of their itinerary, the group saw the Zacalo, including the President's Palace and the National Cathedral, the Latin Tower; Chapultepec Park (Maximillian's castle) and the museum of anthropology; the Folkloric Ballet at the Palace of Fine Arts; a bullfight; a Jai-Alai game; the University of Mexico; the House of Tiles; the sight of the Three Cultures; the Pyramids; a silver factory and a glass blowing factory. One

day was spent at Toluca (town 50 miles from Mexico City) which is known as the market city and has blocks of open-air market stands. Two days and two nights were spent in Taxco, a quaint, picturesque town which is still called the silver capital of Mexico. Returning to Mexico City, the group spent half a day in Cuernavaca, the Palm Springs of Mexico where they visited the Cortez Palace, the Bonda Gardens, and the Cathedral.

Although many of the people spoke English and even the movies and the television programs originated from the United States, the girls did get the chance to practice their Spanish during such activities as taking bus rides, ordering meals, telephoning, and shopping. Shopping also acquainted them with Mexican monetary values as they found that while some items such as fruits and nuts were quite inexpensive, other items such as cake mixes were extremely high. On a personal relationship, the girls found the people most friendly and cooperative and always willing to help out.





Marion Romps Over Linn-Mar

Marion smothered Linn-Mar 46-0 September 5 under a barrage of Indian offense to open this year's football campaign. Marion ate up yardage gaining 219 yards rushing and 58 yards through passing.

Indian defense, not to be denied, did a tremendous job. Marion pounded LM back for a negative 26 yards in the rushing department. LM had 54 yards gained in passing but they threw for five interceptions. Mark Witte and Dennis Schmuecker highlighted defensive play. Each recovered a fumble; Schmuecker led the destructive path against LM knocking down several passes while Witte snared three interceptions which is more than some players could hope for in a whole season.

There were several fine performances by players offensively including two TD's by both Mark Witte and Greg Morris. A Verne Atwater to Mike Walker pass clicked for a 22 yard touchdown. Kurt Anderson blasted over from 3 yards out in the final quarter for six points. Dave Ward kicked a 17 yard field goal along with three extra point kicks. Paul Martin made a pair of two point conversions to supplement two touchdowns.

The lopsided score may seem awesome and perhaps it is. A Marion team hasn't won that big for a long time. This team coached by Mr. Les Dollinger has great potential and it would be worth one's while to keep an eye on this "up and coming" squad.
