Marion held on in the final period to win the game 76-71 and gain revenge for the losses of last years' team to Anamosa's co-champion squad.

Then Prairie began to show its strength in the heavier weights.

Pins by the Hawks in the last three matches put the meet away and gave Prairie

a 37-13 win.

The Little Hawks also won a victory over Marion's JV team 34-14. Glen Mc-Cue, Tom Bowen, Carey Omess, and Gary Bolden scored wins for Marion.

Manchester scored a win over Marion's wrestling team on January 16, 34-15. Dennis Oliphant pinned his opponent and Rick Danford gained a 5-0 decision over the 123 pounder from Manchester. The

Indians then suffered a long dry spell be-fore 185 lb. Chuck Reilly added a pin with ten seconds left in his match. Ken Trout drew with his opponent at 115 lbs. to round out Marion scoring. Marion's record in dual meets now stands at 3 wins and 4 losses.

The Indians next contest is the WaMa-C conference meet. Dennis Oliphant and Chuck Reilly were winners last year and will be contenders again this

Brase led the Prairie team to their fifth win 71-61, but was supported by Gibney with 16 and Waite with 11. Marion's scoring was balanced with 20 from Meggers, 13 from Greg Morris, and 10 by Mark Witte.

#### MANCHESTER

Marion's reserves helped spark a come-from-behind victory at Manchester with a blazing fourth quarter attack. The Indians outshot Manchester 28-16 in the final period to send the game into overtime. Then Dennis Schmuecker continued Marion's surge by scoring all six overtime points to defeat the Manhawks

Early in the contest the home team threatened to run away with the game as Ryan Miller led the surge to a 22-7 first stanza score. The second and third quarters were fairly well balan-ced although the Indians cut Manchester's advantage to 12 points in preparation for the final rally.

The last moments showed Mark Witte splitting the nets with two free throws to crop the Manchester lead to 69-68. Paul Dyer hit a free throw to set the stage for Charlie Knudsen's last second goal following a rebound.

The Indian attack was led by Greg Morris' 20 points followed by Mark Wittes' 17, Meggers' 13, and Knudsens' 12 with his 17 rebounds. Miller was the games high scorer with 34 and Harbaugh added 12 to the Manhawks' score.
