

This S. E. S. potluck is one chance to get involved with things that happen at our school!



2/3 cup honesty when recording calories


1 teaspoon shame for all those excuses for your weight gain

3. Select a stall and enter.


4. Light up. (If you don't have a light you can always ask the girl next to you.)

5. Listen to others in the restroom, cough, gag, and complain.


6. Repeat the procedure as often as desired. (Blame the teachers if you get caught).



### Kray and Long Earn Places On 1st Metro Team

Several Marion wrestlers were honored by being named to the All-Metro wrestling team selected by the eight Cedar Rapids metro prep coaches.

Two Indian wrestlers, Jim Kray and Rick Long landed first team berths which included 10 grapplers that qualified for the state meet. Kray competing at 98 pounds finished at 13-2 overall, while heavyweight Long finished sixth in the state and posted a 22-7-1 record.

Marion dominated the second team selections landing 5 berths: junior Mark Moeller (24-3-1) at 105 pounds, senior Kevin Klopfenstein at 112, junior Tom Stalkfleet (19-4-0) at 132, senior Dan Hoke (19-6-1) at 138, and senior Randy Olsen (15-5-0) at 185.

Three other Indian wrestlers, Dave Mc-Elligot at 126, Marty Carter at 145, and Mark Zeigler at 167 made honorable men-

Kevin Klopfenstein was also named the recipient of the Indian Award, the highest award a Marion athlete can receive. Kevin had an outstanding year winning

three tournaments plus the sectional title. He led the team in pins (13), to go along with the best overall record (25-3-0). Included in this was his pinning all three of his opponents in winning the Wamac tournament, and he had only 4 points scored against him in dual meets all year long.

The future does not exactly look too bleak for Marion wrestling, as the varsity current 31 straight unbeaten dual meets isn't even the best streak in the school. The junior varsity has rolled along with 41 straight wins. So another normal season has ended for the MHS wrestling team.

#### BB Ends with Winning Streak



The basketball season has ended, but for the Marion basketball team the season was just beginning. Marion closed the season with a rush, winning their last five regular season games and 6 of their last 8 to finish in a tie for fifth place with Independence in the final Wamac standings (a 5-9 record.)

The streak ended however, at Monticello in the first round of district play losing to the Panthers, victims of the Indians twice earlier, 74-59. Just four nights earlier, the Indians had beaten the Panthers in their dimly lit gym, 58-55 Other wins during their latest action included back-to-back bombings of Manchester 81-64, and Independence 76-55 as the Indians avenged earlier losses. Both games saw Marion scoring over 30 field goals, pretty fair shooting for 32 minutes of basketball.

Having an off night (26% shooting the second half against Monticello in the districts) was not the way Marion hoped to end its season, but their final 6-13 record almost represents two different seasons for the Indians, the first ten games (0-10) and the last nine (6-3). Most people will probably only remember the 13 losses and big defeats.

The Marion basketball team was not the team it was at the beginning of the season. It was a winning team at the end, as they showed that even though they didn't have a record of a champion, they had the desires of champions.



### Ping-Pong Tourney Draws Fans


