

The Exorcist

For months now, William Peter Blatty's novel of demonic possession -"The Exorcist," has been topping the charts of fictional best sellers.

The narrative revolves around 12-year-old Regan MacNeal, the unfortunate victim of satonic possession. Regan's mother, Chris, a potty-mouthed young actress, desperately seeks help from a Jesuit priest, Father Damien Karras.

The murder of Chris' movie director, Burke Dennings, flings a rumpled, but thorough police detective, Lt. Kinderman, onto the scene. Kinderman reminded me of a famous NBC cop by the name of "Columbo."

Blatty writes the story from three view points: First, from the view of the Jesuit-Karras, His research of the supernatural, his guilt complex over his dead mother, his faith, and his short-comings are all knitted together into the portrait of the priest's personality. Second, from the perspective of Chris MacNeal--. Everyone on the homefront observes the workings of the demon. Chris' faith in Karras, and in her religion is tried and tested. Her maternal concern is evident from the tension-

He pulled off something of an upset in the Metro Indoor meet, by finishing third in the 40-yard dash in a time of 4.7 seconds (in a field that includes two 1973 AA state finalists).
