



## Marion 9th Capture Wamac, Prairie Titles

Marion's 9th grade track team captured the frosh team title last Saturday in the annual Prairie Relays with 57 points.

Host Prairie was second with 49.5 to nose-out Linn-Mar by a half point. Anamosa (31) and Maquoketa (13.5) followed.

Coach Bob Thurness' young Indians captured two individual events to win the team championship, as Bruce Winch won the long jump in 17-1, and Matt Moeller took the pole vault in 10-6.

Team depth paid-off for the Marion yearlings, as Al Zalaznik was 3rd in the long jump, Ron Cook was 4th in the high jump, John Ickes was 3rd in both the discus and shot put, and Greg Stolze placed in a tie for a second in the 100-yard dash with an:11.1 clocking.

All four Marion relay teams grabbed runner-up honors, as Moeller, Zalaznik, Greg Albaugh and John Peterzalek won the shuttle hurdle, and Steve Ransier, Greg Nolte, Albaugh and Winch took the 880 event.

The foursome of Stolze, Ransier, Winch and Mike Freilinger won the mile relay in 4:06.7; Albaugh, Nolte, Ransier and Stolze teamed to grab the 440 relay and Nolte, Larry Atwater, Freilinger and Winch won honors with a 3:56.1 in the mile event.

The day before in the annual Wamac Conference frosh-soph meet on the Indians' oval, Thurny's yearlings nipped Tipton for the team title, 82-81.

For the fifth consecutive year, Marion High School has laid claim to the Wamac Conference All-Sports trophy!

The Indians, thus, are the only conference school to capture the traveling trophy since the honor was initiated.

#### CARDINALS TAKE A CHANCE?

. In case you missed it, the St. Louis Cardinals obtained the contract of lefthanded pitcher Ron Bryant of the San Francisco Giants in exchange for the pacts of Arkansas pitcher Tony Gonzalez and Tulsa outfielder Larry Herndon, both C.R. performers in 1972.

Bryant was placed on the Giants' voluntary retired list in spring training and he can't be placed on the Cards' active list until June 6 (60 days after the start of the season). Are the Cards taking a risk in signing a player like Bryant? Who

He was the National League's ONLY 20-game winner in 1973 when he compiled a 24-12 record. Following a spring training accident, Bryant slipped to a 3-15 mark in '74. He retired from baseball late in spring training this year, but has since expressed an interest in playing again.

The Cards received permission from the Giants to talk to Bryant, and that they did! Following preliminary contact by V-P Jim Toomey, Director of Player Personnel Bob Kennedy visited Bryant at his Flagstaff, Ariz. home.

"Kennedy reported that Bryant's attitude toward pitching again was enthusiastic," said Exec. V-P and General Manager of the Cards Bing Devine, "although he (Bryant) recognized he would require an extensive training program, probably simi-1 ar to spring training. The exact procedure for Bryant's conditioning will be developed in consultation with Cardinal Manager Red Schoendienst, pitching Coach Barney Schultz and trainer Gene Gieselman.

Bryant signed with the Giants in 1965 and he appeared in one game in '67. He has a career major league record of 57-55 with a 3.90 FRA.

"Obviously, we're taking a risk because of Bryant's inactivity," Devine admitted, "but we had the opportunity to acquire a pitcher with a winning record in the National League. Now we'll just see what the results will be!"

#### BIG LAD FOR LAWRENCE U.

.One of the tallest basketball players in the Wisconsin Valley Conference, Todd Sladek, a Merrill High School senior, has been accepted for enrollment at Lawrence U. in the Midwest Conference for the 1975-76 school year.

Sladek, 6-feet-8, 195 pounds, earned honorable mention status on the All-Wisconsin Valley Conference team last winter and on the Channel 7 (WSAU) allstars. He was fifth in conference scoring with a 16-point average and he hauled in an average of 9 rebounds per-game.

Sladek's best game was against D.C. Everest H.S. when he poured in 34 points and and pulled down 17 rebounds. A 44% field goal shooter and a 70% shooter from the charity stripe, Sladek led his team in scoring and rebounding for the second straight season. He is currently competing on the Merrill track team and he has



Winners for Coach Jerry Skilling's team were Rick Floyd, who was clocked in 4:35.5 to capture the mile run, and Dave Moore with a 2:04.5 clocking in the 880 yard run.


Moore was the Indians' individual standout, as he also placed second to Anamosa's record-setting Brian Darrow in the 440-yard dash with a:51.9 time, and he was fourth in the 220-yard dash.

The Indians also received second-place points from the 2-mile relay team of Gary Fickel, Reed Martin, Perry Anderson and Brian Donohoe (8:31.5), and the medley quartet of John Murdoch, Fickel, Kevin Lamphier and Floyd with a 3:46.9 clocking.



Lone double winner in the meet was Vinton's sprint standout, Larry Abemathy, who won the 100 (:10.5) and 220 (:23.0) dashes. However Anamosa captured firsts in 8 of the 18 events.
