
"Well?". . . Ten pairs of eyes anxiously scanned her face as the fearless leader announced, "You'll be staying up the hill in the attic of the mess hall."


What could be a better way to kick off a great new sports season than to


#### "a new look in freshmen homerooms"

The team hopes to build a better ability to work together for the Kennedy Invitational on September 20.




Band Has New Look

#### RON MITCHELL


