Coming off a decisive win Jan. 14 over West Delaware 33-13, the Marion wrest-ling team defeated conference foe Tipton Tuesday night 33-19 to up the dual record 6-1.

Greg Hebert started with a forfeit at 98 pounds, but Terry Carter (105 lb.) and Doug Stancel (112) both dropped decisions 3-4, 0-2, respectively, to tie the score. Senior, 119 pounder Brian Hoffa, smoothly pinned his man in 3:22. At 126 lbs., Robbie Bolyard defeated his Tipton opponent 5-3.

Tipton refused to give in, as their 132 lb, wrestler pinned Ken Waters. However, the Indians showed their balance, where Jerry Goehring registered a fall in 1:00 at 138 lbs. Scott Oglesby handily defeated his man 6-0 at 145 lbs. to give Marion 24-12 lead. The 155 lb. class proved to be very exciting match and ended on a favorable note for Marion; junior, Larry Atwater, pinned a tough Tipton 155 pounder in 3:20. Pat Jones, 167 pounds, lost his match 5-13 and Mike Omess also was defeated 4-8. The final score ended 33-19, after heavy-weight, Troy Hames decisioned his man 3-1 man 3-1.
