Of rain in front of the morning sun. I closed my eyes against the wetness


but still Heard the rainbow. I'm the only one.

be one star.


"Since we are trying to make the drama program stronger, we welcome anyme who is willing to help with set crews, lighting and costumes, " said Mrs. Boyer.

Linn-Mar scored on a 43 yard run.


After Marion and Linn-Mar scored once again leaving the first half score 22-14.
