The Magic Ends

In the first round of state football playoffs, the Indians won an exciting game 14-10 over 5th ranked Mt. Pleasant for their third comeback victory of the season. With the score 7-7 late in the 4th quarter, Mt. Pleasant kicked a 25 yard field goal to go ahead 10-7. The Indians then drove 78 yards on nine plays with Scott Benest catching two Tope passes for 40 yards. Tope then lofted a pass to King who caught it at the 4, and ran it in for the game winning TD. It was the Indian's first playoff appearance since 1984.

The Indian's blanked Keokuk in 2nd round playoff action 14-0 in front of 2,500 fans. Ben King rushed 134 yards on 26 carries. Marion's defense limited Keokuk to a mere five first downs, 107 yards total offense, 73 yards rushing and 34 yards passing. The first score came on a Tope pass to Benest into the end zone with King converting on the extra point to make the score 7-0 at halftime. The Indians second

The beat-up Indian's came back just 4 days later to face a tough Waverly Shell Rock opponent, and left the playoffs with a 16-0 defeat. Marion was enthuseed to play in the UNI-Dome where Waverly had played 3 times. Marion's offense netted a total of 30 yards. The Indians felt comfortable going into the half down 6-0 but were unable to score in the 2nd half. The offense couldn't get it going all night. They had to start drives from their own 11, 37, 40, and 1 yard line. Jason Chappell punted 7 times for a 36.4 yard average. The Indian defense had a tough time and spent nearly three-fourths of the game on the field. The Indians bow out with great memories and an 8-3 record.

Job Shadowing: PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

has taken an active part in the Job Shadowing program.

Jobshadowing is a program that was started in 1981 as a joint effort between Linn-Mar and Marion. In the following years, Washington and Prairie were added to the program, and since then, job shadowing has joined the metro

Mr. Bailey, one of MHS counselors, mentioned that, "Job shadowing allows students the opportunity to experience, first hand, the advantages and disadvantages

In previous years, job shadowing was a required course for the sophomore class at MHS but since then, the program has been changed to a volunteer basis program. Even though the program is a volunteer commitment, eight hundred students from the metro area took an active part in job shadowing last

According to the guidance office, the entire sophomore class is targeted for the job shadowing because sophomores need to have an some type of idea on what field they would like to be involved in when they enter the work force and if they don't, the program helps students just that much more develop and an insight of what type of field they would like to go in to. Also as part of job shadowing, students learn what kinds of subjects that they need to focus on and what type of classes and training they will need to have taken to perform in certain occupations in today's competitive work force.

Job shadowing for this year will go from January to May. Before January, information about the program will be given to sophomores during English classes, free periods, and study halls. Some parts of job shadowing requires book work,

Every year since 1981, MHS but Mr. Bailey says that the majority of the program involves "hands on" experience.

> When a student decides what type of field to job shadow, the student works with an experienced professional in their field of interest for 1/2 of a day. With the medical and lawyer professions, groups of students usually go instead of individually because of the tight schedules and high wages that these types of professionals have.

> Most of the students that job shadow say that they had enjoyed participating in the program. In certain instances, some students did not have such a great time because the person they shadowed was too busy and didn't get to spend any time with them or the field was interesting, but involved many things that they just didn't like, but for the most part, most that took part last year believe it was a exciting and valuable experience.

Jon Stickney, who is interested in going into law enforcement, participated in job shadowing last year and spent one-half of a day job shadowing Marion police officer Ron Holecek. John spent 21/2 hours on patrol with Ron. Jon says that he really enjoyed participating in job shadowing last year. Jon's words of what he thought of the field he job shadowed last year; "This was a learning experience. It made my decision greater and I think riding with a police officer helped my views that other people have against cops. They aren't as demeaning as people betray them to be, but some cops can be demeaning to the pub-

Pulp is a relatively new form of art, used to make paper but it can also be used to make 2 and 3 dimensional images. She is teaching for one week which is partially by a grant from the Iowa Arts Council which is funded by NEA (National Endowment for the Arts).

She went to the University of Iowa and got her BA and Art History and also got her MAT at the University of Iowa. She taught art 5 years in public schools - two years in the inner city of Kansas city and three years in Cedar Rapids.

She was introduced to paper-making during a maternity leave and has continued for twelve years. Now she works on papermaking daily in her art studio. She sells her work locally through the Corner House Gallery. Also she teaches about five weeks per year in schools throughout the state of Iowa. She says that to be doing it that long she really likes it. And she said that students at MHS are talented and creative students.

Mrs. Shultz commented, "This was a very productive and interesting week for students. They got the opportunity to try a new art form and got to meet and work with a professional artist. I enjoyed this activity and would like to get the chance to try paper-making and marbling again."




