
Many people didn't dance their shoes off, except for the wild and crazy Spunky Punky, which shows that Seniors really know how to get down and boogie.

Boys TRACK

At the sixteen team track meet in Tipton the Marion boys track and field team obtained forth place with the 1600 medley relay team, Royce Sanks, Brad Holub, Casey Swanson, and Jon Stickney receiving first. Second place in the 4 X 800 was taken home by Stickney, Northway, Tschopp, and Swanson. Also receiving second was Stickney, Claypool, Northway, and Swanson in the 4 X 400.

Their next bus ride was to the Coed Coe track meet. Some races were eliminated due to unorganization and no lights. The Marion Team still performed to the best of their ability.

The Marion track meet held April 18 had some top performances including Chad Zrudsky in the high jump. He's only a freshmen but he can jump 6'1", beating the last meet, when he jumped 5'8". Brad Holub received first in the long with a jump of 18'7". The 1600 medley relay team, B. Holub, D. Druecker, C. Swanson, and J. Stickney had a stunning performance. Through out the whole race it was nose to nose, and then the baton was handed to Jon, Jon blew the runner away and they received the gold. Second place winners were Dean Druecker in the 100. Matt Balk received third in

Up next was the ninth and tenth grades meet. Marion won six out of eight relays. There were sixteen total teams but no team points were given.

Then the Prairie relays were their next competition. Tschopp

set the meet record in the JV 800 and Stickney received first in the Varsity 800. The medley relay team received second, the runners in that race were, Holub, Sanks, Druecker, and Swanson. Fourth place medal winners were Zrudsky, in the high jump, and Stickney, Claypool, Northway, and Swanson in the 4 X 400.

Next on board were the Tipton Relays, in which the 1600 Medley Relay was won by Holub, Sanks, Swanson, and Stickney. In the 4 X 400 Stickney, Claypool, Northway, and Swanson placed a great second place. Marion placed fourth out of sixteen teams.

At the Marion Invitational the Boys Track and Field Team received fifth out of sixteen teams. Second place medalists were, Tschopp, in the 800, Holub, Sanks, Druecker, and Swanson in the medley. Stickney, Northway, Swanson, and Tschopp in the 4 X 800. Third place event winners were Stickney, Claypool, Northway, and Swanson in the 4 X 400. Nate received fourth in the shot put event.

At Cedar Falls Jon Stickney broke another meet record in the 400. Stickney, Swanson, Claypool, and Druecker got third in the 4 X 400 and Swanson, Northway, Tschopp, and Borst received fourth in the 4 X 800.

Anamosa Relays consisted of nineteen teams, Marion accomplished getting eighth. Stickney, Borst, Tschopp, and Swanson received first in the 4 X 800. Stickney, Claypool, Druecker, and Swanson received third in the 4 X 400.

The last and final track meet was the Wamac meet held at Marion's Track. Jon Stickney was

an all class champion in the 400 by setting the Conference record with 50.6 seconds. In the 4 X 800 Casey Swanson, Chad Borst, Dan Tschopp, and Jon Stickney finished first and also set a new record with eight minutes and thirteen seconds. Nate Werneburg accomplished first in the Shot Put and Zrudsky finished first also in the High Jump. Dan Tschopp received a controversial third in the 800. In the 4 X 200 Druecker, Claypool, Northway, and Sanks received fourth, and in the 4 X 400 Stickney, Druecker, Claypool, and Swanson also received fourth. In the Medley Relay Holub, Wiley, Schuler, and Borst received fifth.

State will be held on May 27 and 28, in Des Moines, Iowa. The following participants will be attending Jon Stickney in the 400 and 800, Dan Tschopp in the 800, Dean Druecker, Casey Swanson, Josh Claypool, and Jon Stickney will be competing in the 4 X 400 and the Medley Relay, Casey Swanson, Jon Stickney, Chad Borst, and Dan Tschopp in the 4 X 800.

GIRLS TRACK

A very young girls track team had a tough growing year. Only three seniors (Dianna Findlay, Natalie Detling, Dawn Schoeberl) and two juniors (Meghan Turner, Teresa Mitchell) were on the team, the rest of which was made up of two sophomores and a large freshmen group. Things were further complicated by Natalie Detling's surgery, which meant she couldn't run for part of the season; then Dawn Schoeberl had to stop running dur to illness. The girls stuck it out with new head coach Dan French and made improvement over the sea-

One problem with the small team was the lack of team points there weren't enough girls to fill all the relays and in the field events, in only one meet was there a Marion high jumper. No school records were touched, but the girls were motivated by bettering their personal bests.

Weather was also a factor beginning with a miserable night at the Pekin Relays held at Coe April 11th. Wind, rain and cold made the meet a poor one for spectators, and no lights on the Coe field caused the cancellation of some events. Field events scored most of the points with Stacey Tschantz 5th and Harmony Henderson 4th in the high jump, Katy Boyer 4th in long jump, Dianna Findlay 5th in shot, and Boyer 5th in the 100M.




It was nice for the Marion Invitational, but the team score was low. Teresa Mitchell took 6th in the 3000M run despite the fact the girls ran an extra lap.




GIRLS TENNIS
