When asked what Mr. Twachtmann thought of the Holiday dinner he replied, "It's like a family thing for us and it only happens once



Dear Students of Marion High School,

I'm writing you to let you know what drugs and alcohol will get you in life. Just like you, I attended Marion High School for 2 years, stayed in high school and enjoyed it. Then in the summer of '92 I started experimenting with drugs and alcohol. I was a beginner and didn't know what it was capable of. At first, I didn't realize how it was affecting me. I started slacking off in school, I was coming home later and later at night which was causing family problems when my drug and alcohol problem became worse. I started lying and stealing from the people I loved most. I was out of control and I didn't care, all I cared about was my addiction and nothing else. Then I found myself dropping out of school. My family and friends didn't know what was going on, the only thing they knew is that I changed from a person with a caring and positive attitude to a person with frustration, hatred, and emptiness, my love for my family was turning to bitterness. When they would ask me what was going on, I would hide my feeling sand say nothing. I kept saying to myself that I didn't have a problem. I was in denial and didn't want to face my addiction.

About six months after all this started, I found myself waking up in the Linn County jail drunk tank with a hangover. I had no idea what I was doing there. I was scared and confused. Later, I found out that I stole a truck and had gotten into a high speed chase with the police. I got lucky and nobody got hurt. I was slapped on the wrist and let go.

This started being arrested countless times and thrown in jail. This went over the next two years and then in November of '94, the year I was supposed to graduate, I was given 5 years in prison. I gave 5 years of my life for drugs and alcohol because I refused to get help for my problem.

I am now starting my second year and still have a long ways to go. I now know the realization of what drugs and alcohol can and will do. I now know it will destroy your life

right in front of your eyes.

I hope you understand that drugs and alcohol are nothing to mess with. What happened to me is another example of what it will do. So please, if you have a problem seek help right away and if you are thinking of experimenting please DON'T because it won't get you anywhere, but in trouble or even dead.


I hope you take the time to read and listen to my story and think about it before you pick up that bottle or take that drug.

THE BOARD POLICY

he board believes weapons and other dangerous objects in school district facilities cause material and substantial disruption to the school environment or present a threat to the health and safety of students, employees and visitors on the school district premises or property or school-related activities within the jurisdiction of the school district.

7 chool district facilities are not an appropriate place for weapons or dangerous objects. Weapons and other dangerous objects shall be taken from students and others who bring them onto school district property or onto within the jurisdiction of the school district or from students who are within the control of the school district.

eapons are de fined as: any object intended to, or used in such a fashion as to cause or threaten to cause injury to another. This would include, but not be limited to objects such as guns, air guns, facsimiles of guns, knives, etc., as well as

other objects such as a broken bottle or baseball bat used to cause or threaten to cause injury.

tudents bringing a fire arm to school shall be expelled for not less than twelve months. However, the superintendent shall have authority to recommend this expulsion requirement be modified for a student on a case-by-case basis. For purposes of this portion of the policy, the term firearm includes any weapon which is designed to expel a projectile by action of an explosive, the frame or receiver of any such weapon, a muffler or silencer for such a weapon, or any explosive, incendiary of poison gas.

eapons under the control of the law enforcement officials shall be exempt from this policy. The principal may allow authorized persons to display weapons or other dangerous objects for educational purposes. Such a display shall also be exempt from this policy. It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the principal, to develop administrative regulations regarding this stances of weapons being brought to a Marion school this year. In the first incident, a student at Vernon was expelled for having a knife and showing it to other students. The second incident involved an 8th grade student. A faculty member reported seeing him with a knife at the tennis courts. This student has been expelled for the remainder of

that they could get into so much trouble for bringing a simple pocket knife or plastic gun to school, but Mr. Twachtmann said that this means, "...an automatic expulsion to anyone with a weapon on school grounds."

If a weapon is seen in your locker, Mr. Twachtmann will take the student and a faculty member to the locker, search the locker, and if a weapon is found, call the parents and the police department. He will then have a conference with the student's parents and suspend the student until the next board meeting where he will request an expulsion. Hunting guns and rifles are also considered weapons even if they are locked in the trunk of your car. It will count as having a weapon on school grounds, and an expulsion will be requested at the school board meeting. If a weapon is taken onto school grounds during a school-sponsored event, the police will be called and will result in expulsion for the student. If the student is from another school, Mr. Twacht-

mann will call that school district and tell them that the student was seen with a weapon.

At anytime during the day, Mr. Twachtmann can have a locker search if there is valisd reason to suspect that a weapon is in the locker. Routine locker searches can be held at any time with twentyfour hour notice.

The Marion school district is not the only district

is currently debating a policy and Linn-Mar has also dealt with the weapons problem. On Tuesday night, December 19, the Linn Mar school board voted to expel two students. One high school student was given a one year expulsion for violating the districts weapons policy. One junior high school student was given an indefinite expulsion for violating the district's tobacco, drugs and alcohol policy with the provision that the student may reapply upon recommendation by appropriate professionals that "the student would not be in danger to himself/herself or the student body."

Linn Mar superintendent Joe Pacha told the Gazette that the school board and administration took two cases, "to ensure the safety" of Linn Mar students and staff.

"We want to assure the district and patrons that any further violation of these policies will be dealt with appropriately." Pacha added.

Districts throughout Iowa are taking the same steps for the safety of students and staff members.




