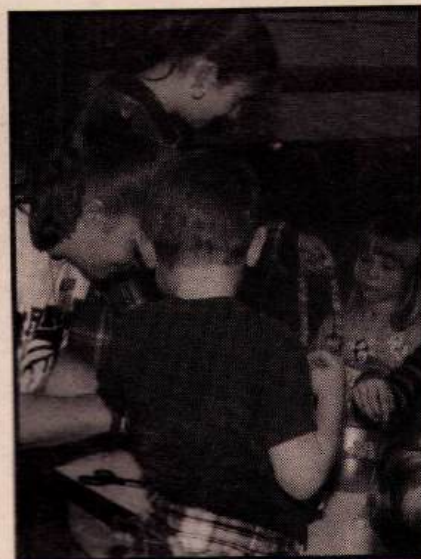

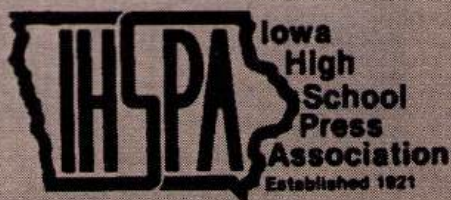

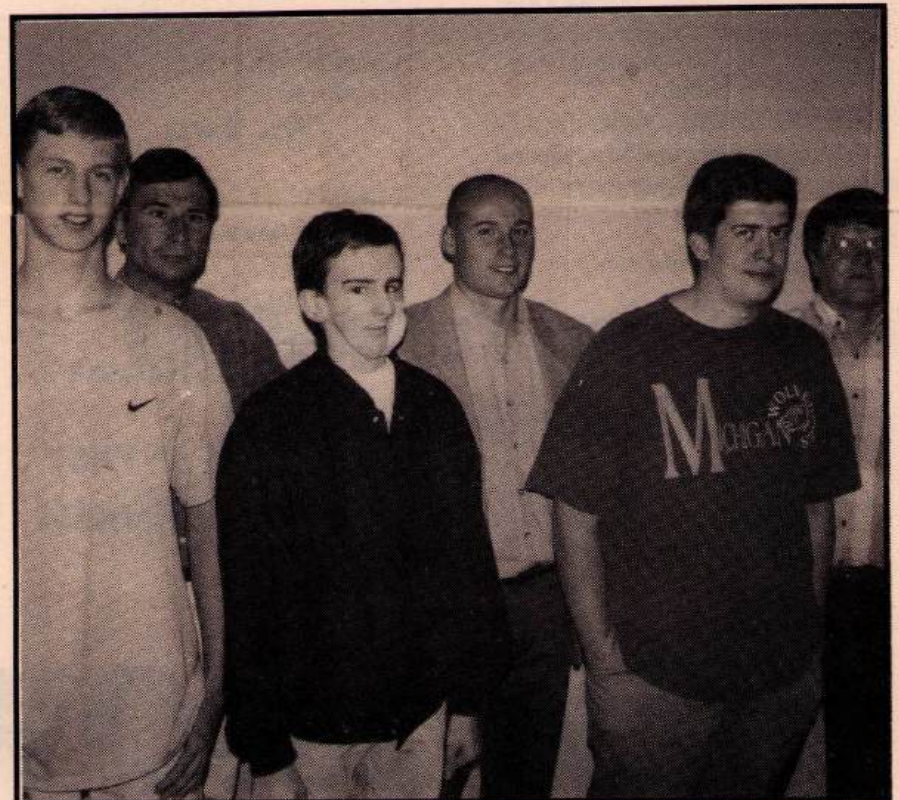

Marion High School announced that three of its students, Tony Straub, Ben Smith and Steve Godecke, are winners in "Capitol Opportunity" an exclusive, MCI-sponsored scholastic competition among American civics and American History students in 23 schools nationwide.

"Marion High School is extremely pleased to honor these three students for their outstanding performances in MCI's "Capitol Opportunity" competition" stated Mr. Scott Immerfall, a teacher in the history department. "Their participation in this competition along with all of our student

entrants, offered them a special opportunity to be better educated and informed American Citizens."

More than 2000 students entered the competition nationwide. To enter, students in grades 10-12 in participating high schools were invited to submit 400 word commentaries on one of the three current topics, pre-selected by MCI and related to the '96 presidential election. The faculty in each high school were responsible for selecting the three most outstanding commentaries among their school's contestants. In recognition of the participation and support of the faculty in this project, the Marion High School library was presented with a collection of books, videos and teaching guides on American history and government.

FIELD BIOLOGY-

TRACKING THE ENVIRONMENT

Since 1978, the Field Biology class has been keeping track of different aspects of the environment in this area.

Between August 29, 1996 and September 23, 1996, the Marion High School Field Biology class conducted a series of tests to acquire information about Indian Creek along the Sac and Fox Trail.

The class was divided into six research groups. Each was responsible for conducting physical, chemical, and biological tests. This particular site was chosen because of its favorable attributes such as the deep water and the limestone base. Mr. Sloan is part of a group called the Iowa Rivers Project which is composed of school primarily in the Eastern Iowan area. Once the project is finished, the information his class has gathered will be published on a bulletin board along with other the other members of the same group. This bulletin board will allow teachers and students alike from the area to compare their results with others who have posted in the area.

By conducting this experiment the groups learned that the stream was moving at a proper pace and in average health, by the primary reason for conducting this experiment is to give students the hands-on experience that they couldn't from the classroom. Though limited by because of the time spent traveling between the stream and the school, Mr. Sloan enjoys this project because of the substantial benefits that the students will gain through hands-on experimenting. Nowhere else can the students touch and experience animals as they did than in their natural habitat.

When the aquatic studies were completed, the students moved in to

terrestrial studies. This study of plant and animal life looked at wildflowers indigenous to Iowa and the succession of foliage in the area which changes from weeds and flowers to a mature forest. The study was done at Squaw Creek Park and the area along Indian Creek.

While the students were able to wear shorts and t-shirts for the early fall aquatic study, heavier winter clothing was a necessity since much of the later work was done in the snow. The final project studies one specific mammal in the area such as deer, beaver or mice.

"Students seem to remember more of what they learn when they go out in the field and study it first hand instead of from a book," commented Mr. Bates. "This is the main purpose of having a Field Biology class."

In the current schedule, Field Biology meets for two periods every day. Because this class combines both science and the composition skills needed to produce final reports, both science and English credits are given.



During the terrestrial study, Chris Raymond, Scott Dickey and Walker Burgess tracked the development of plant life from weeds and flowers to dense forest.



In studying various mammals, the group marked the deer trails and studied the direction the deer were moving on that day. This can show the deer behavior for the day, such as whether they were moving to the water or to the forest to rest.
