

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

Mr. Bailey aided in a studentconducted study which showed the relation between absences and grade point average in the senior class. Results showed nearly all (89.6%) of the students who have a 3.0 or better GPA missed 5 or fewer days of school and only a small amount of these students (10.4%) missed more than 5 days. Marie Schmidt. This 14-year-old Waterloo freshman was expelled from her school after running away from home for five days. She had been an honor roll student, but had trouble adjusting to high school. State officials say Waterloo did not offer acceptable alternatives to Schmidt. Iowa Department of Education Director Ted Stilwell said, "The main reason we've taken such a very long time to deal with this is because of its impact- not only in Waterloo but in other districts.

"Attendance is a sensitive issue," explains Mr. Doyle, who feels that "it is not [an educator's] goal to put people out on the street." He agrees with the new 14 point guideline which sets limits on how severe districts can be when disciplining absent students. These guidelines allow districts to enforce reasonable expectations of student behavior, provided that there are available educational alternatives. The ruling says that these new guidelines are merely meant to be guiding principles, not inflexible requirements.
