Mr. Bates and Mr. Immerfall pile on the mashed potatoes while waiting in line for the Holiday Dinner.

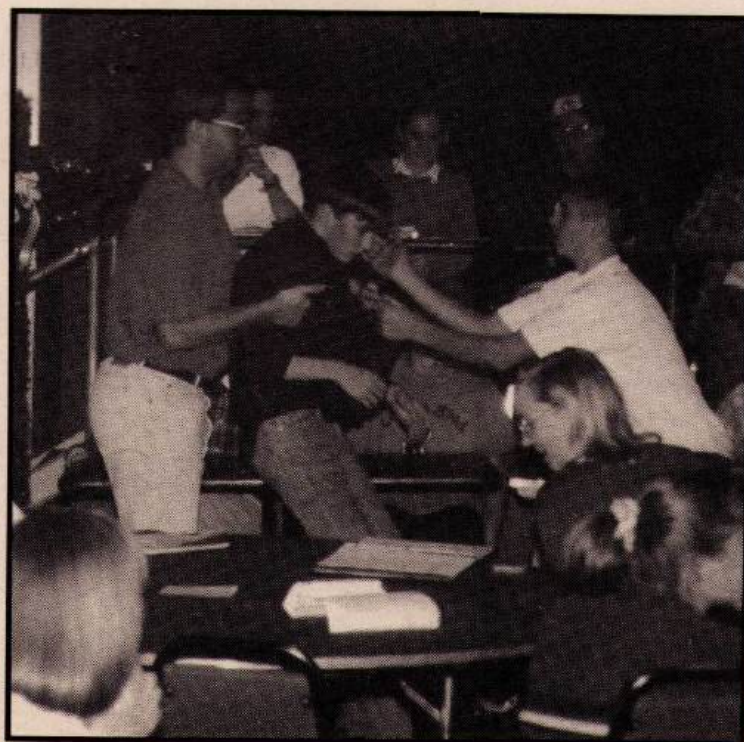

TITANIC

Starring: Leonardo DeCaprio, Kathy Bates, Billy Zane, Bill Paxton, and Kate Winslet. Director: James Cameron

Take one huge ship, a "downtown boy falls in love with uptown girl" relationship, and one massive iceberg, and you have one this holiday season's biggest blockbusters. *Titanic* is a wonderfully put together movie about one of the biggest tragedies in the history of man. Director James Cameron has done a spectacular job in the making of this epic adventure by weaving a touching love story into the history of the Titanic's disastrous maiden voyage. The story begins with the aged heroine Rose, recognizing herself as the girl in a picture retrieved by a ship while watching a report on the finding. She notifies the captain of the ship (Bill Paxton) and is flown out to the ship where she introduces herself as one of the survivors of the Titanic. The real story then begins as she recalls the whole voyage to the captain.

It is a beautiful story in which Rose (Kate Winslet) as a young lady was one of the upper class passengers on the voyage, traveling back to America to be married to her snobby fiancé, (Billy Zane). Then she meets young Jack Dawson (Leonardo DeCaprio), a common young man who won his ticket for the voyage in a hand of poker. Sparks fly and soon Rose and Jack are deeply in love. Their relationship develops and the voyage steadily approaches certain doom as obvious mistakes are subtly made by the captain, crew, and owner of the ship. Then *Titanic* hits the iceberg and the question is asked "Will Jack and Rose survive?" The rest of the movie is a

heart pounding struggle for survival as Jack and Rose try to escape the ship which is slowly but surely being swallowed by the sea.

This was an awe inspiring movie with beautiful scenery, great acting, and a story line will hold theatre-goers mesmerized until the chilling yet uplifting end. Girls will love it for the romance and guys, well there's chaos and a lot of people die in the end so that'll keep you happy too. I think Tarantino's choice to base the movie on a book tied it up in ways "Pulp Fiction" didn't quite hold together. It may not have as many neat little vignettes, but as a whole it really is a better film.

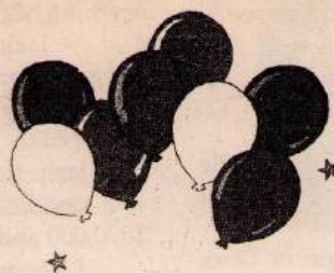

Many places have different packages, and you have to choose which one is good for you. Let's see how the prices of the two most chosen companies for senior pictures compare with couple of smaller companies.

At Linn Photo you get one clothing change at no additional cost. But the only package that they have is 1-8x10, 2-5x7's and 4 wallets for \$19.95. This is a good choice if you don't want to spend a lot of money.

At Read's Photography you have many different packages to choose from and different finishes. The prices range from \$312 for 1-16x20, mounted, 2-8x10's or 1-11x14, mounted, 2-5x7's, 4- 4x5's one year book photo and 96 wallets. To \$109 for 1- 8x10, mounted, 2-5x7's, 4- 4x5's, one year book photo and 8 wallets, and many more packages to choose from depending on how many pictures you want and how much you want to spend.

At Today's Image they have four different packages. From 1 pose you receive 1-8x10, 2-5x7's, and 54 wallets for \$71. From four poses you receive 1-16x20, 2-8x10's, 4-5x7's, 4-4x5's and 162 wallets for \$256.00.

Halls has a lot of choices that vary, from one pose you can get 1-8x10, 2-5x7's, and 16 wallets for \$106.50. To three poses with 1-8x10, 4-5x7's 6-3 1/2 x5's and 16 wallets for \$199.00. Also if you go in July you receive 48 free wallets.

Most of the seniors were pleased with their pictures.

"I went to Natural Setting and I didn't like the pictures and the price was really high. So I went to Hall's and they were much better and the price was reasonable." - Breana Carrillo

"I went to Country Oaks, the price was kind of high, but my pictures turned out really good." - Heather Dirks

You also need to think about the expense of the books that you'll use throughout out the school year, the costs of eating lunch, if you stay and eat here and a parking permit to park in the parking lot.

Then when the school year begins, you start thinking of the costs of dances, because Homecoming is right around the corner, and you want to make this the most memorable Prom. You need to figure out the costs of what you plan on wearing to the dance, where you are going for dinner, and to get you and your date into the dance itself. After you've arrived and paid to get in, you have to pay more money for pictures you plan on getting.

Then, you start getting letters from colleges asking you to come and visit their campus and see what you think of it. It costs you money just to go there, and when you finally make your decision about which one to go to it costs about \$50-\$100 for a starting deposit. But it's going to cost you a lot more than that to get an education there.

Then, comes the time to graduate, and you have to think about your announcements, where you are going to have your party, how much food will be needed, and if you need to rent things. Announcement packages vary according to how many extras, such as t-shirts, tassels, cards, memory books, are included in the order. An average order of 50 announcements, a mid-price memory book, t-shirt, name cards, and cap and gown will run around \$140. Add to that the expenses involved in the reception. This includes cake, decorations, pop and punch, and other food.

Can't wait until your senior year? Just consider how much your parents are looking forward to it and all the expenses they will have.

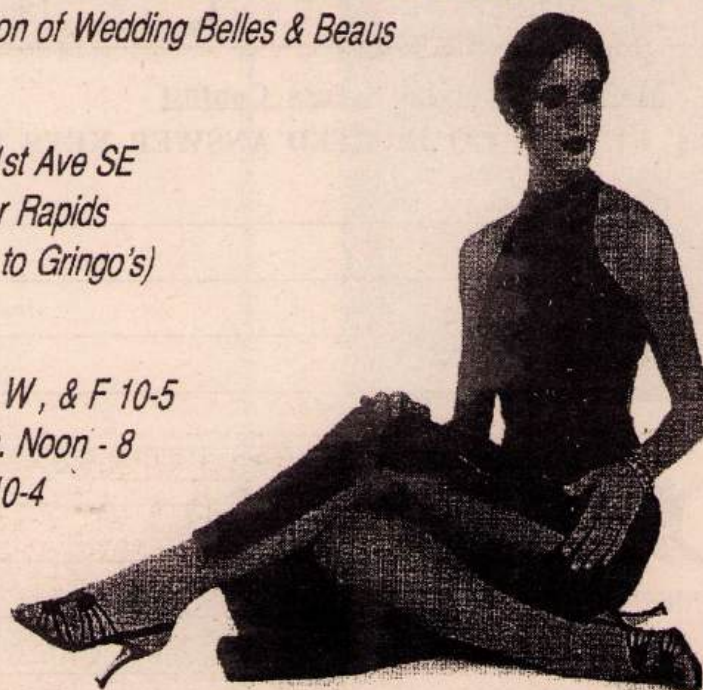

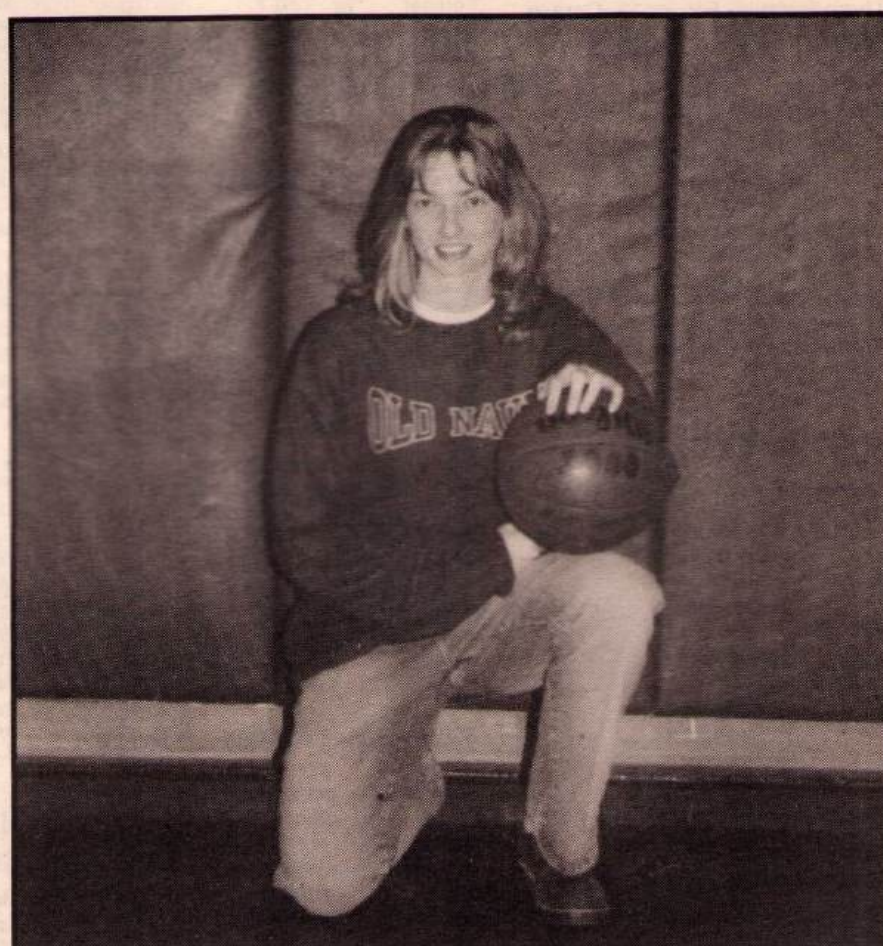
