
SODA-What Does It Stand For?

Our school's lunch program would not make enough money if the majority of students bought their lunch from the fast food vendors." Smaller schools such as Springville can't afford to bring in fast food either, so their lunch program has decided to offer more selections made by the lunch ladies. They have hamburgers, pizza, chicken, and sandwiches and fries everyday as an alternate to the main choice. Diane Flemming, lunch advisor for the Marion/Cedar Rapids School Districts, was alerted of this idea and said that she would talk to her manager about offering this to Marion High School.

Portion size and a lack of food by third cycle were two other problems that were addressed to Ms. Flemming. She said that she wasn't aware of the problem of not having enough food for the third cycle kids and she would talk to her manager about that as well, and she also added that the cooks just guesstimate on how much food to make each day. Marion High School's lunch cycles are on a six week routine. The same lunches are repeated every six weeks, so the cooks look back and see how much of food



There are many things that we all look forward to as we get older and start taking on more responsibility. Buying a car, getting a job and being able to handle our own "hard earned" money. But it's not as easy as it seems especially when it comes to money. It all starts when you get a job and in order to keep your money safe you open a bank account. So for your convenience you get an ATM card and maybe even a checkbook. But do you know how to protect yourself when using your ATM and checkbook.

Now a days it's easy for anyone to take advantage of you. So many people are taken advantage of because they don't know what to look for. All over the high school you hear more and more of someone being taken advantage of. In many cases it's because you trust the wrong person. Possibly someone that you have known for a while. It all starts because someone gives out their ATM pin number, leaves checks laying around, or even cashes checks for someone that they know.

For ATM and check fraud there can be large consequences, though many times it is to hard to convict someone of the actual crime. So in order to keep things straight save all of you transactions through your accounts and record your check statements. It will save you a lot of time and money in case something does occur.

The big mistake you can make is allowing others to make transactions through your account. Someone may ask you to cash a check for them through your ATM, but it could end up getting you in trouble instead of them because it's your account. When you allow them to write you a check it is by law an oath that they have the money in their account. Though if they don't have the money in their bank ac-

count the police will come after you for the money because it is considered fraud.

If something does happen and your account is tampered with your best move is to go to the police. There are many different actions that they can take in order to prosecute. Typically they have you fill out a report with a police officer and depending on what was taken and how much will determine what further action has to be taken. The most common thing is to give the other person a grace period and then charges will be filed if it's not paid with in that amount of time. It all can range to a fine, to probation to even jail time. So in order to keep yourself safe use the following simple tips.

SAFETY TIPS FOR USING THE ATM MACHINES

- · Be careful of "con artists". If anyone asks you to withdraw money from the ATM for any reason, walk away.
- When approaching the ATM be alert for any suspicious persons or circumstances.
- Have the ATM card ready to use prior to approaching the machine. This will shorten your time at the machine.
- When using the ATM, position your body so that no one else can see your enter you pin number.
- · If you with draw money do not count it or expose it while you are in close proximity of the machine.
- · At night use ATM's in well lit areas.
- •Use ATM's that have clear visibility for automobile and pedestrian traffic.
- · If possible, have a friend accompany you to the ATM.


deter a vandal. * If your car does get hit make sure to report it IMMEDI-ATELY.






