


House: Haunted Mansion Where: Center point Scare Factor: 4




man, this coach is Coach Boone played by Denzel Washington. He uses the help of the longtime coach and hero of the school to mold the multiracial team into a united force, to become one of

NECESSITIES IN YOUR CAR DURING WINTER

Winter. It always seems to last longer than the other seasons. Whether it is the cabin fever that hits after the first snowfall or it's tumbling on the ice every time you step outside, the season never seems to end. For us drivers, winter brings out major hassles: having to get up earlier to clean off your car after it has snowed overnight, having to allow for more time when you're driving somewhere so you don't slide into a ditch, and so on. Though the weather may change, our busy schedules rarely do. We're out there everyday driving to school or work in subzero temperatures with our heaters blasted and snow coming down faster than our windshield wipers can brush it off. So sometime within the next month we will have to do that painful task of taking our coolers and beach towels out of our trunks and replacing them with the necessities Mother Nature has required us to purchase. After taking the opinions of tow truck drivers, mechanics, auto parts salesmen, and experienced drivers, these are the most agreed upon items they recommended as the most important ones to have in your car:

Common sense: If you don't have this, you shouldn't be behind the wheel. If you know you don't drive well in bad weather conditions, stay home or get someone to drive you where you need to go. If you don't know how to handle winter driving, you're putting everyone around you at risk as well as yourself.

Cell phone: Everyone agreed to this as the number one item you should have in your car during the winter. If you don't have a cell phone, it is a good idea to carry a phone card or loose change. If you don't smoke, a great place to keep change in your car for phones and parking meters is in your ashtray. With a cell phone it would also be smart to make sure you're battery is charged or get a charger that hooks up to the lighter in your car.

Jumper cables: If your car dies and you find that one decent person who will help you jump start it, don't always count on them having what you need. Carry jumper cables yourself. Even if you car doesn't act up this winter, maybe

you can end up being that one decent person and give someone else a hand.

Window scrapers: No explanation needed. Unless you like getting frostbit by using your arm to clean off your windshield every morning.

Gas can: Many times people just don't pay attention to that annoying fuel light that comes on when they're low on gas, thinking they can just squeeze out a couple more miles on fumes. Wrong. Keep this in your car at all

Sandbags: A couple of these will add weight to your car so it isn't sliding all over the road. You can also open one up under your tires if you get stuck in the snow to help provide traction. Another source that is good for this other than sandbags is kitty litter if you're a little tight in the pockets.

Fluids: Brake fluid, transmission fluid, and antifreeze. While you may not need to keep these in your car throughout the year, it would be wise to check them frequently and have them readily available for when you need them. One fluid that would be smart to keep in your car during the winter is Heet. Heet is a gas additive that you put in your tank each time you fill up to prevent your gas from freezing. This comes highly recommended by local auto parts salesmen.

Spare tire: This should need no explanation. Aside from the obvious reason it may be used, a spare tire could also add that extra weight your car may need so it doesn't fishtail around corners.

Blanket and extra clothes: Boots, socks, and thick gloves are also suggested for permanent storage in your car during the winter. If you get stranded in the country, and let's face it, Iowa has a lot of country, extra layers could really come in handy. Otherwise if the heater in your car breaks down or you end up rolling in the snow, you may need these items then.

First Aid Kit: Rain or shine, sun or snow, winter or spring. This is another item that it couldn't hurt to stock your car with. It doesn't have to be an elabo-

rate gym bag crammed full of a neck brace and a portable gurney. Gauze, bandaids, and Tylenol are the basics you may need. Nonperishable food can also be stored away with these for emergencies.

A couple more items that deserve mentioning are flashlights and tool kits. Tool kits are especially useful if you actually know how to work on your car and with a flashlight you want to make sure your batteries are fresh. You would be surprised by the number of people who keep a flashlight in their glove box for months at a time and are shocked that the batteries are dead when they go to use it later.

Though these are the top recommendations by those people who know what they are talking about, it does not mean you have to run out after the first frost hits and make a day out of buying all of these supplies. It is up to you what you think you will need in your car, depending on your experience and how much driving you normally do. Just use your common sense and know that you don't have to pack your car with survival gear if you're just going to the store. And good luck driving this winter (you'll probably need it).

ton Vikings who were in 1st place in the district with a 5-1-1 record.


Leading rushers in this game were Forkner with 9 carries for 209 yards, and Burrell with 14 carries for 107 yards.






Jaclyn Hugg watches while Taylor Heim tries to convince everyone that he deserves to be honored because he's so worthy.
