
Winter Wonderland





Usually, WPA ends up being slightly formal, but this year people dressed on the more casual side. A lot of students decided to




Many students grab a date and slow dance during the WPA dance. If you didnt have a date you could socialize with friends.



A STRUGGLE IN SOUTHEAST ASIA

Until recently, I was completely at a loss for what to write about this issue. Then the tragic tsunami hit Asia, a natural disaster much larger in size and aftermath than any tragedy America has ever seen. When the news of the tsunami first reached me, I was struck with grief for those who lost their lives and those who lost their loved ones, but soon after I returned to my business. Unfortunately, I think this was the attitude of most of the youth, and finally I have realized that.

When the tsunami happened, I honestly



had a very vague idea of what one was. When I asked someone to elaborate, the only answer I was ever given was: "Well it's an earthquake under the sea." Technically that's correct, but it doesn't really give anyone who hasn't been in the situation a picture of what truly goes on. Recently, though, I had the opportunity to talk to someone directly affected by the tsunami, which caused





my recent spark of compassion and interest in the disaster. Their intriguing story of the way the human spirit reacts in a natural catastrophe compelled me to do my own research on the topic.

A tsunami, which in Japanese means "harbor wave", can in fact be caused by an earthquake, but it can also be caused by a volcano, meteor impact, landside or explosion. The difference between an earthquake tsunami and the other tsunamis is in



the way they are generated. When an earthquake tsunami occurs, it is because the plates shift and the water becomes displaced. When it tries to regain its equilbrillium, large areas of the seafloor elevate and subside causing the tsunami. When a landslide, volcano, or meteor impacts occur, the water is just displaced because of those different reasons.

Although the tsunami in Asia seems so distant from our everyday life, we need to remember

that something like this could possibly happen in our country. In 1958 Alaska had a tsunami, and it caused a 525 meter flood up shore. It didn't have nearly the consequences the recent tsunami in Asia did, but it still shows us that these tragedies can happen close to home. Actually, as far as the United States goes, a tsunami can happen anywhere on the Pacific coast or on the Caribbean Coast.

There is an estimated more than 175,000



deaths in the recent tsunami, making it big enough to wipe out the city of Marion twice. This makes the devastation there all too real for me, and I hope this information has helped make you a little more knowledgeable about the catastrophe in Asia. 





you pretty much the whole movie, but that is kind of unavoidable.



Bad Backs &

Classroom Clutter

Does your back hurt? How about your shoulders or neck? Do you feel a tingling or numbness in your hands? If you answered yes to any of these questions, your heavy backpack may be to blame. New studies are being released all the time that further state the dangerous health risks that accompany backpacks.

Thousands of cases of Rucksack Palsy have been directly tied to wearing heavy backpacks. Rucksack Palsy is when the pressure of the straps on the shoulders interferes with neural impulses that in turn bring on the condition. If tingling or numbness in the hands occurs for an extended period of time, it can severely damage nerves, which will lead to muscle atrophy (the loss of muscle use and power due to nerve damage) The question is how do you know how heavy is "too" heavy? Doctors say that the weight of a backpack should not exceed 15% of the body weight of the wearer. For example, a 180 lb. individual should not wear a backpack that exceeds 27

When you wear a backpack that is to heavy, your body will try to keep the center of gravity between your feet. With the extra weight on your back, your midsection is forced to move forward which puts abnormal forces on the spine. To counter this, your head will shift forward. This would mean looking down. You compensate this by bringing your head up, which makes part of the neck curve to a greater extent. It's



very stressful on the neck, shoulders, and spine.

Here are some things to keep in mind when purchasing a backpack:

Consider more than looks when choosing a backpack. Ill-fitting ones can cause back pain, muscle strain, or nerve impingement.

Padded shoulder straps are the best to have because they help to relieve pressure on the nerves around

the airputs.

If your backpack comes with a strap that goes around your waist, it should be used whenever possible because they are designed to help stabilize the load on your back and will be easier on your body.

It is also very important to wear your backpack on both shoulders. When it is worn on only one shoulder severe back misalignment can occur. Also, you have a much greater chance of getting a slipped disc in your spine, which can be very painful and can cause immobility. The backpacks that are designed to go over only one shoulder have a less chance of causing back problems since the weight is spread over the back at a slant. There is less tension on the shoulders and the neck. However, it can still cause nerve damage if left on for long periods of time.

lemma of health problems caused by backpacks, there is the issue of the space that is taken up by all of the backpacks on the floor in every class. This would be a serious problem in the event of a fire or tornado when everyone would be hurried to get out of the room. Students and teachers would have to hurdle over the bags to get to safety. Also, on a regular basis students have to watch out where they are walking or else they might fall. Mrs. Martin said, "I understand that it is convenient for students, but it is very hard to move around with not only a room full of students, but a room full of backpacks."

Is there a solution to this problem? The main option is for students to grab only the needed materials for the class they are going to and leave their backpacks in their locker. Although it would take time away from the between class socializing, it would be a lot easier not only for you, but for your classmates to move around through the classrooms.

Not only would the students' health benefit from leaving backpacks in lockers, but they would also benefit from a more secure classroom. Teachers have many opinions about making the classroom safer. "Safety with backpacks is a concern, and in a perfect world, I would have bigger lockers all through out the high school," associate Principal Mr. Ehresman said. "Students wouldn't be allowed to have backpacks or jackets in the classroom because it is always a possibility that someone could have weapons or drugs concealed in their bags."

If students want to continue to carry their bags through-out the day like it is now, then be cautious with theirs bag so it doesn't have to be an issue.



counselors. They help students with these types of problems often and know




what they are doing. Remember to keep on task, and






