Boycott banning of backpacks



Parking problems persist at MHS

Among many controversial issues at Marion High School is the parking situation. In the past few years this problem has received more attention as the enrollment of students at MHS has increased rapidly. Consequently, more and more parking spots have been required. But that's where the problem lies: more parking spots have NOT been created. Of course, there have been many different propositions for fixing the situation, but which is best?

While it's a very difficult decision to make as far as what action should be taken, the pros and cons of possible solutions can be taken into account to help arrive at a final conclusion. Currently, the parking situation is said to be a problem, but if you really look into it, it's only an inconvenience at this point. While it may be difficult finding a parking spot, it is certainly far from impossible at the same time. However, next year, this will most definitely change. With an extremely large freshmen class turning into sophomores (the year most obtain their driver's license), more and more parking spaces will be necessary. Of course, there are many different ways to approach this conflict. If you're a senior, you might just say, "Make the sophomores walk!" While this might make the upperclassmen content, unfortunately, it doesn't satisfy the majority.

One fairly obvious solution seems to be to either create another parking lot, or expand upon the ones that are already in place. Behind the high school, right near the back parking lot there is a decent amount of field space to expand the lot with more spaces, although it wouldn't be nearly efficient enough to completely solve the problem. Near the tennis courts there is also room to expand on the small parking lot, but even combined with the expansion of the back parking lot, it wouldn't completely rectify the situation. (It would help, however, if people were to go into this direction for a solution, this would provide a great amount of help towards fixing the situation.) Then again, the expansion or creation of parking lots might not be very plausible depending on the school's financial status.

Another method of correcting the situation that has received some attention, at least from students, is a sort of age-type system to determine who receives parking passes. It seems like a good idea as the majority of privileges in high school and among reenagers increase as age does, although it may be quite difficult to implement. (One may not receive a parking pass, and, instead, a new student that is older does receive one. Many students might disagree if this is how such a situation would be handled, especially if they were to be the one involved in it who didn't receive the parking pass.) A problem may also arise if say, an older sophomore and a younger junior both apply for the pass. Although very unlikely, the sophomore may possibly be older than the junior, and therefore, receive a pass before they do.

Parking passes could also be given out by simply a firstcome first-serve basis. This is another solution, although it maybe not nearly as fair as the other two. It at least seems to

be plausible and wouldn't be too difficult to put into place, as a similar method is already being used. However, this method will create more and more of a problem as more students gain the ability to drive at the school. Obviously, there could be a sense of confusion as well as far as how many passes should be dealt out. You could give out an unlimited amount of passes, but they would prove to be quite useless, as a parking spot is only so useful when it's available.

So, I ask you not to change your mind and take your stand on the matter, but simply encourage you to remain openminded to all solutions. While neither of these measures may be the correct answer to the parking problem, an even more legitimate solution may be obtained by further development or combining of any of these ideas. At this time, however, the problem seems to simply remain a slight inconvenience for the drivers of MHS. Once it develops into more of an issue is

the time that it may receive much more consideration, but for now you should enjoy the peacefulness of the current parking compared to what could become of it next year as enrollment continues to rise.


