




















# **Editorial Policy**




The air in the room feels as if it has become stale as the teen sits and waits for their doctor to come back in. As they let their feet dangle off the examination table they think in their mind all of the worst outcomes, as their optimism slowly drifts away. According to statisticbrain. com, six out of ten 17 year olds and five out of ten 16 year olds are sexually active. Only two out of ten teens get regular check ups.

Getting checked is an important part of life if anyone is sexually active. Protected or unprotected sex, no matter what teens still need to get checked. Being safe is the total point. Over 50,000 cases of HIV happen every year on average and most of those cases are found in people between the ages of 16 and 26, according to the cdc.gov. One out of two sexually active people will get an std by the age of 25 according to the Huffington post. Talking about sex especially as a young person to either their parents or doctors is extremely awkward, but it is a topic that needs to be talked about and needs to no longer be considered taboo. There are over 55 million new cases of STD's and STI's a year just in the U.S.

15.3% of teens have had sex with more than 3 people by the time they reach the age of 17 and also 46.7% of teens the age of 16 did not use a condom or take their birth control or Depo-Provera the last time they had sex according to the cdc.gov.

Having sex may seem cool but truly it isn't. Staying abstinent or even just not having sex at all will keep a lot of problems off teens already stressful lives. Having sex costs money and these days it is very hard to have some cash just lying around. A box of regular Trojan condoms cost \$3.95 at the grocery store and that isn't one size fits all. Birth control costs between 15 to 50 dollars a month depending on what type of birth control the young girl gets. But if they cannot get birth control, Plan B a morning after pill for those girls that have unprotected sex the night before, costs around 30 to 50 dollars a pack. Plan B though isn't meant to be constantly taken. It has devastating effects on the female organ reproduction system according to PlannedParent.org.

Safe sex doesn't just mean wrap it up or pop a pill every day, it means to get checked regularly and even every six months for HIV and Aids virus. Unprotected sex has consequences some are graver than others but they are issues that have lifelong defects on a person and are hard to over look as life goes on. It is anyone's personal choice to have sex but, staying safe helps everyone in this world.


# Walter aims to out shoot others



Place a dot of glue on inside of the hoop. Place the starter of leather lacing in glue. Then tightly wrap the lacing around.


### Step Two:


