Students affected by school starting too early


Teens face the struggle of getting up at a ridiculous time for their learning.


































Racial tensions rise due to public ignorance

In today's world, racism is still among us. Many



Although this particular game against Solon didn't go the way the team was expecting, they worked together as a team and fought. They did go to war.


Frazier said after the game, "The chemistry with this team is the best I've ever had at my time at Marion. It's a lot better than I thought, too."




The dance is planned to occur on October 11th, the day after the homecoming parade and game. If you plan to go, get your tickets while they last before the Thursday comes.


In the 1920's, after European



With her secret now spilt, the teenager's parents gave her some ideas on how to deal with what she was going through. "My options were to get better or get help," Rael added. The ultimatum wasn't quite what Rael was looking for to get her through this tough period, "Those options didn't help because I continued to do so. 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
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
