Mr. Greg Semler, principal, without a doubt, loves what he does and he has seen the problem with how teachers are dealing with the behavior.


"We have seen a slight uptick in frustration among the teachers, but it is incredibly manageable and in the past couple of

In the past couple years the words "school shooting" have been in the news way too often. With 82 school shooting incidents and 36 deaths this year so far school safety is a controversial topic. Many people believe that the occurrence of mass shootings could be solved by a ban on guns, but focusing only on school shootings the problem could be remedied by increased school safety.

Several schools have put in place new technologies to protect students. Some have metal detectors at the front of the building and security guards, but in this district they cover the door windows to classrooms and lock all the doors other than the main entrance.

The district has upgraded as far as security per-

sonnel however, now instead of sharing a resource officer with Linn-mar, the students now have their own. One of the downsides is that there is one person for all five schools in the district so it's hard to feel protected. The resource officer is also in place to assist the administration with students misbehavior, and in this district most of the misbehavior happens in the younger schools, so the high school seems like it is not top priority for them.

In an attempt to protect the school a bit more all of the teachers went through A.L.I.C.E training, which stands for alert, lockdown, inform, counter, and evacuate. Teachers this year have been very serious about student safety and want to ensure that if something terrible we're to happen, the building would be prepared. The staff has also made it clear that they, of course, do not want anything to happen here. However that being said if it did, students need to be prepared and not assume that it could never happen to us.

Parents and guardians can help the administrators as well by telling their kids what the family plan is if something were to happen, or information they have learned from events like Columbine, one of the first mass school shootings, that changed the country as it was the most deadly school shooting


at its time. Some options are, if someone were to attack the school the student would run to their house, if its close, or a family friend's house if they live closer. Parents could inform their kids on statistics, things like how it can be dangerous to go to your car because that's exactly where they would expect you to go, and that's why people should run away, because it's statistically safer.

It seems like it could never happen to us, but after a serious threat at Vernon Middle School December 11th, the district realized that it could happen right here.

In theory, the district could potentially hire a security guard for each building and while that may make students feel more safe, one person can only do so much. The country could ban guns, but people who want to hurt people would still find a way. Parents and guardians should tell their kids all they know to keep them safe, but the only way to stay as safe as possible at school is to be prepared in case something were to happen, and understand what to do in dangerous situations. Instead of spending money on school guards, the district should give some of the training the teachers have to students. Some may believe it is too scary of a concept for "kids" to be worried about, but it is just that: a

scary thing. Students are dying in schools, and the best way to prevent that is to prepare students for the worst. There is no perfect solution for this problem facing our country, but there are ways to decrease the amount of lives lost.

prior to beginning regional play. A placement a regionals is the ticket to a chance in the state tournament.


"I think we can put up some wins and get into State," Freymark said.



Top 5 TV shows- Riverdale, The Haunting of Hill House, On My Block, Grey's Anatomy, and Queer Eye.






